Petra Rueda is a member of the Wasco community who is committed to the values of service. Her journey into activism was deeply influenced by her late husband, Danny, who is also a respected WASCO

Wasconian leader. Petra was born in Wasco when there was a hospital and attended all local schools. She comes from a family of eight and was raised in the Catholic Church, having been

baptized and completed all her sacraments. After graduating from Wasco High School, she went to Job Corps in San Bernardino County for two years and received her certification in clerical and accounting. She then came back and worked in management for the department store Kmart. After that, for 18 1/2 years, she served with the Department of Human Services for Kern County.

Petra married Danny Rueda in 1995. They went on to have a daughter, Victoria,

"My late husband and I raised our daughter to be a loving and caring young lady. She is a Wasco elementary teacher's aide at Teresa Burke Elementary School and is earning her master's degree as a speech pathologist. I'm very proud of her."

Early in their marriage, Danny began a lifetime of working for the betterment of Wasco. He joined the Knights of Columbus, was on the Wasco Union Elementary School District board and served as VFW commander. He passed away in 2021.



It is customary for the Shafter Police Department and its officers to deal with quite a bit of gun fire on New Year's Eve. But, this year, officers ended up arresting an Earlimart man who took the celebration a little too far. Antonio Alvarado, 29, was arrested on several charges and was placed on a \$490,000 bond.

Officers were dispatched to the 400 block of North Wall Street in Shafter for reports of gunfire, possibly with a round hitting an apartment door. When officers arrived, they located Alvarado walking with a woman. When officers tried to make contact with Alvarado, he fled, leading them on a short foot pursuit. Officers caught Alvarado and found a 9mm handgun, which was stolen from Tulare County, and empty bullet shell casings. Officers also found damage to the outside of a door, but Gomez said it was not a front door to an apartment but a door to a mis-

cellaneous room.

As they were taking Alvarado to a police car, he yelled out a street gang name, which Gomez said was meant to intimidate officers. Alvarado then proceeded to threaten to shoot officers and their families and also kicked three of the officers. "Some people, they don't know how to act right. In celebratory times, it's really common for people to be shooting fireworks — which is one thing — but there's other people, they need to take it to the next level, which is guns," Shafter Police Lt. Marvin Gomez said.

"Him yelling out gang membership, criminal street type stuff, threatening the officers — at Shafter, we do take that seri-

ously," Gomez said,

Charges facing Alvarado include reckless discharge of a weapon, felon possessing ammunition, participating in a criminal street gang, and several others. According to the agency's website, Alvarado is no longer in custody.

Regarding her vision for the future of this community, "I just want to help build a bigger and better Wasco."






