## Couple passes within days

A joint funeral service was held at First Presbyterian Church in Bakersfield on Monday for local pioneers Donald and Izetta Camp, who passed away just days of each other last week in Bakersfield, after sharing over 70 years together.

Donald Camp Sr., who with his family, operated one of the most well-known farming institutions in the area. He was born in Shafter, while his parents, Wofford Benjamin (W.B.) Camp Sr., and his wife, Georgia Anna Camp, were living at the U.S. Cotton Research Station.

Camp met his future wife when a classmate of his father, Edwin Hugh Agnew, insisted his daughter Izetta invite Donald to a local dance while Donald was in town on business.

After that first meeting, Donald and Izetta courted for several years, maintaining a long-distance relationship, with Donald coming to South Carolina frequently as he oversaw and helped operate the family's Buckfield Plantation.

They were wed in 1952 and raised five children and grew the family empire along the way. In addition to operating D.M.

Camp & Sons, which is a very successful institution, the family also owns and operates Kern Machinery and several other John Deere Agriculture dealerships in the South-

# Plea made for Highway 46 project

A group of local dignitaries hit the road recently to fight for completing the widening of Highway 46.

They made an appearance in Fresno at a California Transportation Commission hearing to discuss plans that Caltrans has of cancelling funding for a project that was previously given the go-ahead that involves

widening Highway 46.

The first phase of the project has been completed, but the second phase is ready to go but the funds are in danger of being pulled off the project for an unidentified future rail project. David Couch, county supervisor in the 4th District covering Shafter and Wasco, testified at the hearing, as well as Shafter City Council member Cathy Prout.

Couch told the commission that the funds needed for the completion of the Highway 46 is more than just the widening of the highway. Couch said, "As you know, people are dying every year on Highway 46. We maintain that withholding funds for a future project that is not even ready to go does nothing to alleviate this problem."

Couch also said that the project will

provide a more sustainable goods movement corridor that connects Salinas Valley with an intermodal rail facility in Delano operated by Union Pacific. It is said that shipping by rail is 10 times more energy efficient and creates 10 times less greenhouse gases than shipping by truck but we need safer roads that connect these intermodal rail facilities.

# No Thanksgiving in Black Friday

My wife has to work this year on the day after Thanksgiving, leaving the chaos which is Black Friday on my shoulders. This has kept me up at night for the past weeks. I have been having flashbacks from previous years, and this was with the aid of my wife in the trenches. I have come to detest this holiday, which is sad, because Thanksgiving is supposed to be a time of gathering of families, reflecting on what you are thankful for, and enjoy an enormous amount of food.

It is ironic that immediately after celebrating the one day set aside to be grateful for all that we have, we go and buy more things on the busiest shopping day of the year. But if that isn't ironic enough, over the past few years, major retailers have started Black Friday on Thanksgiving night.

I think just the opposite than the majority of people who blame it on the stores.



as a couple that “always thought of others, and never turned away from a need,” said Pastor Jeff Chandler.

Chandler told the audience of the time when his daughter was doing a History Day project that involved agriculture, which he knew nothing about. He was told to ask that Don Camp, he would probably know what it is. “Well, he spent an hour with my daughter, patiently explaining to her the subject, and she ended up with an A.”

Their daughter Georgia Bell, who lives in South Carolina, said that her kids remember their yearly trips to California to stay on the ranch. “I also remember the trips that they took back to us in South Carolina. We would have such a time.”

Donald and Izetta were married in 1952, after courting for a few years. Their first date was arranged when Izetta’s father, who was a Clemson classmate of Don’s father, suggested that she ask Don to a local dance while he was in South Carolina on business. That one date was the start of a love affair that lasted the rest of their lives.

They raised five children, and the recurring theme in the life of every child and grandchild who spoke at the service was the love that they had for each other. God and their family.

They leave a legacy that lives on in their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Their example greatly touched others outside of their family also.

Lucas Whootten said that he frequently would go to their John Deere dealership and the way Don, when he was there, and his sons would treat their customers was

special. “It didn’t matter if you were buying a couple of parts, or if you were buying three tractors, you were treated the same, and always with respect.”

Izetta was remembered as a southern belle that was transplanted to California, but never lost that southern charm.

“She was a special lady. She was just as comfortable talking to a dignitary as she was a neighbor, and also treated both of them the same, with respect,” said son Clayton. Tales also abounded about her skill when it came to navigating the way from their ranch off of Merced Avenue, to the schools in Shafter, 12 miles away. “She was always on time, every time. I think she knew how to get us there in the quickest way possible, knowing the way to go the fastest. “Yes, my mother was an accomplished race car driver,” joked Edwin.

Everyone who spoke on Monday, and those who have commented in the time since their passing, has mentioned that the couple were always quick to help those in need, but never expected honors. They and shied away from the limelight, preferring to let their actions and deeds speak for them.

The project in question is the Highway 46 segment 4B, which is a 5-mile safety widening project with bike and pedestrian improvements through the disadvantaged community

of Lost Hills. This project leverages \$17.5 million in federal BUILD grant funding. Another \$33 million is still needed to complete the gap project by connecting two existing four-lane segments.

Council member Prout told the commission that the part of highway in question, named “Blood Alley,” has killed so many people, and the advantages that would result from the completion of the project far outweigh

any future rail project. “The phase of the project that has been completed, which spans from well inside Kern County to the San Luis Obispo County line, has improved the safety of travelers greatly and has resulted

in a decrease in fatalities in the short time it has been completed.”

Prout said at a recent Shafter City Council meeting that the Commission seemed to respond well to the arguments and she

stated that it looks like there is a possibility to add additional funds so that the project would be able to move forward. The Commission will be giving an update on their decision sometime in December.

## Donald Max Camp Sr. July 29, 1925 – Nov. 12, 2019

Farmer, businessman, innovator and beloved family man

A joint funeral service was officiated by Pastor Jeff Chandler Nov. 25, 2019, at First Presbyterian Church in Bakersfield for Donald Max Camp Sr., 94, and his wife, Izetta Agnew Camp, 92, who died peacefully at home within days of each other surrounded by their family. Private interment will follow.

Don was one of two children born to cotton pioneer Wofford Benjamin (W.B.) Camp Sr. and Georgia Anna App Camp while his parents were living on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Shafter Cotton Research Experiment Station.

The family moved often while his father worked for the USDA. When they returned to Kern County, his parents enlisted the help of Dust Bowl migrants to construct a home using well-insulated box cars east of Shafter. There as a young boy, he learned how to drive a tractor.

Don attended Kern County Union High School where he was on the track team. He attended Clemson College, then an all-male military school in South Carolina before deciding to enlist. He needed his parent's signature to enter the Army Air Corps. He was a fighter pilot during World War II running training flights between New York, Florida and Texas.

After the war, he returned to college and graduated summa cum laude in three years with a degree in animal husbandry. His ambition was to become a cattleman. He helped run livestock in the Kern River Valley, but soon found out he could better support the "cowboy habit" through cotton and potato farming.

While traveling back and forth between Kern County and South Carolina, where his family operated Buckfield Plantation in Yemassee, SC, he accepted an invitation from Izetta Agnew to attend a dance with her at Winthrop College. Her father,

a Clemson classmate of Don's father, insisted she write a letter inviting him as he likely didn't know many people in the region. He courted her for several years. After a six-week engagement, the couple wed in 1952 and their union was blessed with five children.

Compassionate and caring, Don often helped Dust Bowl families who arrived with optimism but little else. He empathized with them, having moved around so much as a child. There was always a steady stream of stranded motorists seeking help at the back door of their ranch house near the highway. Don invited every person in, including a jail escapee.

Long after the war, his love for flying never diminished. He flew his own plane, enjoyed fly fishing and bird hunting, and after their children were raised, Don and Izetta traveled the world together.

Quiet, unassuming and a man of humility, Don was a large presence in the agriculture industry and his contributions were innumerable. He championed the family farming operations founded by his father by leading them into the 21st century while embracing industry changes with innovative practices and pioneering crop management.

Along with his sons, D.M. Camp & Sons, under Don's leadership, sought to be a leader in state and national agricultural issues while advocating for local, state and federal water projects and in supporting farmers here in the Central Valley.

Today the company farms nuts, citrus, grapes and vegetables in Kern County. In addition to the John Deere engine distributorship serving the western United States, the family owns and operates John Deere Agriculture dealerships serving the Southern San Joaquin Valley, as well as the high desert area of eastern Kern County.

In 2004 Don, patriarch of the longtime farming family, was honored by the California chapter of the American Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers as their Distinguished Agriculturalist of the Year. "There are a lot of people who do what I do. We've run our farming operation with some awfully good people over the years," he told The Bakersfield Californian, underscoring his modest manner. His values and ethics made him widely admired.



Outside of work, with a servant's heart, Don gave of his time and resources to Mercy Hospital, Bakersfield Christian High School, Calcot, Cotton Incorporated, the American Cancer Society and First Presbyterian Church. He was a member of Stockdale Country Club and the Bakersfield Rotary Club, and served on the boards of Kern View Foundation, the Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and the Quest Club, as well as committees of the California Cotton Study and Cal Poly School of Agriculture. For 31 years Don served as president of the Cawelo Water District, as well as California Planting Cotton Seed Distributors.

A man of the soil, he often said, "I just like to farm." Although accomplished in many ways, Don never sought accolades. "Work hard and be good at what you do, but don't have a big ego and put yourself first above everything," he said.

Don and Izetta truly enjoyed each other's company. By each other's side in life for 67 years of marriage, now they are together again for eternity, after passing just a few days apart. Their reputation and integrity meant everything to them, and together they instilled that in their family.

Don was preceded in death by his parents, and brother Wofford Benjamin Camp Jr. He is survived by his sister-in-law, Floride Findley; children Georgia Bell, Don Jr. and his wife Debbie, Edwin and his wife Kaye, Clayton and his wife Karrie and Carolyn Pandol and her husband Jack. He is survived by 13 grandchildren, 13 great-grandchildren and a 14th on the way.
