

'In God We Trust' decal plan at council

In a City Council meeting that saw only two items on the agenda, the public comment portion of the meeting dominated the action with a packed house of citizens eager to voice their

The majority of the discussion was on the recent proposal that would emblazon all Shafter Police Department vehicles with a decal reading "In God We Trust."

Pastor Justin Medlock of the Shafter Christian Fellowship Church proposed the idea of the decals. Medlock spoke about the need for the decals, similar to those recently placed on Delon Police Department vehicles. "I was not always a pastor, in fact, I was a drug addict for

13 years. It was the words and actions of a law enforcement official that helped me turn my life around." Medlock said that he was stopped on Seventh Standard Road and handcuffed. While in custody, the sheriff's deputy talked to him like a father would talk to his son about how he needed to straighten up and get his life

Medlock believes that the decals would help the department bond with the community and send a positive message to the residents. Medlock also told the councilmembers that they would probably come up against opposition and said that they needed to vote with courage and not out of fear. "I pray that you guys will stand up for what is right and vote that way."

There were several pastors that

spoke on the night, and residents who thought that the decals are constitutional and that each city had a right to make their own decision. Pastor David Vivas Jr. of the World Harvest Church in Delano, reminded the crowd that the national motto, "In God We Trust,"

Juvenile arrested after threats of mass shooting

A Buttonwillow juvenile was arrested after a call was made reporting that the subject had made threats of a mass shooting on social

On May 29, at approximately 11 p.m. deputies at the Kern County Sheriff's Department Buttonwillow substation received a report of an unidentified male juvenile making threats to carry out a mass shooting at the school. Deputies arrested the suspect for making criminal threats and booked him into juvenile hall.

After a search of the suspect's house, it was determined that there were no firearms present at the residence. No other suspects are believed to be involved in the incident.

Buttonwillow substation Sergeant Mark Jackson later told The Shafter Press that the juvenile had been released from custody, and the case is ongoing.

A more substantial presence was made at the school following the incident and at the subsequent graduation activities. There were no incidents following the arrest of the juvenile. It was not clear if there will be further actions taken against the juvenile. —Kern County Sheriff's



Program pushes Valley residents to 'clean green'

The San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution District is looking for Kern County residents who are interested in "cleaning green" and that would be willing to trade in their old gas-powered lawn mowers and other lawn care equipment for new electric versions that will help keep pollutants out of the air.

The program, "Clean Green Machines," gives residents two options to participate in the project. Option 1 requires the resident to purchase a new electric lawn mower or other lawn care machine, replacing their old gas-powered machine. The resident has 30 days to take their old lawn mower to a participating dismantler, along with their rebate application. The SJVAPD advised that you contact the dismantler in advance

to verify the facility's requirements, such as the need to drain fluids, etc., before taking it to the facility. They will provide you with a destruction verification form. In this option, the resident will get a rebate of up to \$100 when the purchase price for the new machine is \$200 or less. The rebate amount is \$150 if the machine was purchased for \$201 to \$350. For new machines that were purchased for more than \$350, the rebate is up to \$250.

There is another option open for residents that does not include the need for the resident to turn in their old machine. In this option, the resident purchases a new eligible lawn mower, edger, trimmer, chainsaw or pole saw. They then just fill out the rebate application and submit it to the San Joaquin



New equipment must be electric to qualify for the program.

Valley Air Pollution District, along with a copy of the receipt or invoice for the new electric equipment. They require the applicant to allow four weeks from the time the District receives the completed rebate application for them to issue the rebate.

This program is a way that the air pollution district is helping the valley reduce emissions into the valley's atmosphere. For more information or for the proper forms, call the district at 559-230-5800 or go to valleyair org/lawnmowers.

SYC begins summer at Minter Field Museum

The summer is here and the Shafter Youth Center, operated by Community Action Partnership of Kern has begun their annual summer program with a visit from the antique Fire Engine #1 that is stationed at Minter Field Air Mu-

Ronald Pierce of the museum explained to the kids how the engine came to be at the museum. The engine was originally the property of the City of Shafter, but eventually became a unit in the Kern County Fire Department. Last year, it was returned to Shafter and is now on display. It has undergone a refurbishing to restore it to its old glory. The kids had a great time sitting in the engine, as well as checking out all of the features on the engine that were utilized when it was a working unit for the Fire

Department. This is the first week of the program, which has a different theme every week. In coming weeks, there will be a Sports Week, Shafter Week, Patriotic Week and Animal Week, which is always popular. It includes a visit from the California Animal Living Museum, with a host of special ambassador animals that the children can see up close, learning about their habitats, diets, and their place in

nature.

The Shafter summer session is just one of the programs offered by the CAPK. According to Angie Nelson, director of the Youth Center, they offer an after-school program which includes help with

homework, as well as recreational activities in a safe and supportive environment. The SYC also offers a Gang Prevention Program that provides Forward Thinking classes to high school students to assist them in making positive changes to their thoughts, feelings and behaviors. It also provides Aggression Replacement Training classes for youth to improve social skills, moral reasoning, anger management and reduce

aggressiveness.

They also continue their commodity distributions. Food is distributed to low-income community residents to alleviate hunger. Participants self-certify residency, sign for commodities that are distributed and self-certify income for eligibility.

For those in need of assistance with their utility bills, they also participate in a HEAP program. This program helps offset the cost of energy for low -ncome households. Participants must meet eligibility requirements, have a social

security number and complete a HEAP application prior to acceptance.

To qualify for HEAP services, participants must provide a current PG&E bill and gas bill andcurrent income verification for all household residents for



Three Shafter High seniors signed letters of intent recently at a ceremony in the Shafter High Library, marking the next step in their educational and athletic careers. Tom Richardson, Isaac Enriquez and Julia Pitter made their collegiate commitments official on last month, cementing their futures for the next four years.

Enriquez signed with Bethel College in Kansas. Enriquez was a standout wide receiver for the history-making Shafter Generals football team who dominated their opponents this last season, making an appearance in the Central Section title game. Enriquez had over five games in which he surpassed 100 receiving yards, as well as scoring over 10 touchdowns on the year. He was a steady force in the General offense.

Enriquez will be majoring in business and playing wide receiver for the Threshers. Enriquez visited the college and was impressed with the campus, the faculty, coaches and the current players. 

has been in existence since

"This is our national motto, and therefore it is constitutional that we have it on our police vehicles. I am a coin collector and know that it has been on our money since the 1800s," Vivas said.

Patriotism came up in the presenttions, with a couple of speakers saying that the decals would be a good way to show it.

Offering a different viewpoint was Shafter resident Estevan Ramirez. He said that he has loves the city of Shafter and has a lot of respect for the men and women who protect it. But, Ramirez said, he doesn't think that putting decals on the cars would do anything to help the community.

He said that he did not felt like a minority for most of his life.

"I know that I am the minority here tonight. But, I will not be quiet. I am going to speak up." He went on to say, "I believe that this action would further alienate myself, and those who do not happen to believe in God, from the rest of the community.'

Ramirez said that people tell him to just ignore it when people are praying and he is not, or in other situations in which he feels separated from the rest of the community. "But, how can I just ignore a decal on

our city police cars? I am not going to ignore this. I want to be involved in my community and not have to feel that I cannot speak my mind or be included."

He went on to say that there are other alternatives if patriotism was the goal. "I love this country. I heard patriotism mentioned. Does this mean that if I don't agree with this proposal that I am less of a patriot than the majority? I don't think so. If patriotism is a factor, why not have a bald eagle or an American flag on the vehicles?'

Mayor Gilbert Alvarado suggested that the issue be put on the agenda for the next City Council meeting, so that the matter could be discussed and voted on at that time.

In another presentation, Gary Rodriguez gave an believe in God, and he has update on the North Shafter Improvement Project, which includes road repair, traffic signs and signals, as well as the inclusion of sewer service for residents in the northern part of Shafter. Rodriguez the sewer service was implemented in 2011. He said that residents started requesting services for different issues in the north in the mid-1970s. He said that progress has been slow going, and he urged the council to make the requested improvements in a more timely fashion.

Rodriguez said that there is an immediate need for sidewalks, shoulders,

and in some cases, stop signs or stop lights around Highway 43 and Fresno Avenue. There were pictures submitted that showed tire tracks where cars had gone onto the shoulders of the highway, at the area where children embark and disembark from the school bus daily during the school year. In some instances, he said, the children are having to cross the street behind vehicles that are waiting at the intersection, another safety

hazard. Mayor Alvarado suggested having an ad hoc committee research the issue. City Manager Scott Hurlbert stated that there is an ad hoc committee in place that has been working and meeting to resolve some of these issues. Alvarado suggested that there be a community meeting where discussions could agreed upon.

Hurlbert also said that there had been requests made to Cal Trans -- the state Department of Transportation -- to conduct a study at the intersection, which is controlled by the state -- to see what should be done to alleviate the dangers for the city's children and other pedestrians. Hurlbert did say that the progress was not moving as fast as they would like, but action has been taken and will

In a regular agenda item, the City Council approved the bid of Bowman Asphalt to do the work on the 2019 Street and Alley Improvement Project. This includes work that will be done on James Street. Bowman came in with a bid of a little over \$680,000. The council approved a budget of up to \$750,000 for the project take place and that was from the city budget.

Man dies in DUI-related rollover, cops say

"The individual who we suspect was driving the vehicle was transported to a local hospital for treatment and was then arrested," said Capt. Jeff Bell of the Shafter Police Department. Palayo was subsequently charged with felony DUI.

Santa Fe Highway was closed in both directions for several hours while the cleanup

and the initial investigation took place. The coroner's office and the district attorney's crime lab assisted in the investigation, which is ongoing.




heart and do what they know is right in their

Suspect in assault on man, 75, in custody

Dear Jamie Stewart,

The second suspect in the assault on a 75-year-old Wasco man turned himself into the custody of the Kern County Sheriff's Office on Tuesday without incident. Marvin Gray, 20, will face charges of robbery, elder abuse, conspiracy and battery with great bodily injury. The victim is now in stable condition. On Monday, May 27, at approximately 6:15 a.m., Wasco City substation deputies were dispatched to a report of a robbery. Deputies spoke with the victim, a 75-year-old male, who informed them he was on his morning walk when he was beaten and robbed of his wallet and cell phone.

Deputies later determined the robbery occurred at approximately 6:00 a.m. in the 1000 block of 7th Street. The victim was transported to a local area hospital via ambulance. The victim sustained life-threatening inju-

ries and was in a medically induced coma. Deputies located a surveillance camera that recorded the actual robbery and managed to identify one of the two suspects involved as 28-year-old Dabrae Dugan of Wasco.

Deputies obtained a felony warrant for Dugan's arrest, charging him with robbery, elder abuse, conspiracy, and battery with great bodily injury. On May 2, at approximately 10 p.m., Wasco substation deputies located Dugan in the area of Birch Avenue and 12th Street and arrested him without incident. Dugan was booked into the Kern County Sheriff's Office Central Receiving Facility.
