Street and park improvements underway

The City of Shafter has been working on improving its parks and streets, having several improvement projects in process.

One of these is the Stringham Park Improvement Project, which is in full swing. A new bus stop has been installed, replacing the stop that was located at the corner of Central Avenue and James Street. The new site is intended to alleviate the traffic

at that intersection, and also will be easier for riders to navigate the area. Included in the project are new trees at the park, as well as a shaded structure and playground. The project is expected to be completed by June.


Also on the slate of projects are shoulder improvements for Santa Fe Way and Los Angeles Avenue. East Los Angeles was closed as of April 15. It is closed going both directions, starting at the intersection of East Los Angeles and Santa Fe Way, moving west. The road will be closed until approximately Monday, May 6.

New alert system

In other city news, a new alert system is going to be implemented in the city, for all interested residents. Announcing the implementation of the #CodeRed #Shafter-Alerts Notification System. This system will allow officials to quickly deliver emergency and nonemergency notifications to targeted areas within the city or the entire community by phone call, cell phone, text, email or the free mobile alert app.

Jovita Sanchez: A lifetime of faith, family

Jovita Valentina Sanchez was a remarkable woman

who graced this world for 101 years. She had a profound impact on the lives of those who loved her and

was a pillar of strength for her family and friends.

She was born on Valentine's Day, Feb. 14, 1923, in Leon, Guanajuato, Mexico, and peacefully passed on March 29, 2024. She came to the United States at age 5, first to Famoso and then to McFarland, where she was raised. At 14, she married Ray R. Sanchez and moved to Wasco. She was married to Ray for 63 years and had nine children together, whom they raised in town. Ray passed

Her home was a sanctuary of warmth and laughter, where stories were shared and memories were made. She approached motherhood with a boundless love, nurturing her children with tenderness and guiding them with

Jovita leaves behind a legacy of family distributed across multiple generations, with well over 100 grandchildren.

Gossamer Grove gets hit by car break-ins

A string of vehicle break-ins has prompted the Shafter Police Department to advise residents to be extra vigilant in protecting their cars and property.

According to Lt. Joshua Stephens, several residents in the Gossamer Grove area had their vehicles broken into, with the actual vehicle thefts thwarted.

It wasn't just random vehicles, either, with Kias and Hyundais being the targets of choice. It is not known why these were targeted, especially since the make of choice in recent years has been Hondas.

"On Sunday night [April 14], several vehicles had their windows smashed and broken into, with the apparent goal of stealing the vehicles, but they didn't complete the deed," said Stephens.

One resident who fell victim to the perpetrators was Joshua Vaughn, who woke up to the unpleasant surprise on Monday morning. "Completely had no idea, I woke up super early, and I couldn't believe my eyes," Vaughn said. "It's a real big bummer when you're in a rush for work and you come outside to that sight of the broken

glass on the ground and realizing you can't

even start your car to get to work."

According to police reports, one resident had security camera video of two individuals running from a vehicle that had an alarm going off.

Stephens said that while they don't know why those specific makes of cars were targeted, it is worth the time to take measures to protect vehicles and property. "I definitely think it's something for people to be cognizant of that those vehicles for whatever reason are targeted," said Stephens. "Preventative measures are always the best. Keeping your vehicles in well-lit areas, making sure the vehicle

is locked, making sure that there aren't

valuables inside the vehicle that you can see from the outside is always a good practice. We tell people all the time not to leave anything of value inside their vehicles. He said that it just tends to make residents a target for people who want to steal things.

Stephens emphasized that department is making strides on the case, and they hope to have an update soon.

He said that during this incident very few calls were made to the Police Department. "We would rather come out and have nothing come of it, than not get any calls and have an incident like Sunday's



Council holds off on police crimes analyst



The Shafter City Council denied a resolution on Tuesday to hire a crimes analyst that would be **SHAFTER** stationed in the Shafter Police Department. According to Acting Chief Randy Milligan, the analyst would identify crime patterns, trends and hot spots using data analysis techniques. This person would also research and evaluate data related to criminal activity and calls for service. Crime prevention and problem-solving would also be a part of

"The function of the position would include criminal investigations, apprehension, crime prevention and reduction strategies," Milligan said. He also said that he or she would support the operations sections to make patrol activities more ef-

Currently, the property technician is filling these duties, which takes a lot of



time. Milligan said that the need for a dedicated crimes analyst has been overdue.

Before the item went before a vote, Mayor Chad Givens asked if this position is truly a 40-hours-a-week position. Milligan said that the person would also do other duties as needed, such as perhaps manning the coming Gossamer Grove area substation. Givens said that it may be a position that the city will probably grow into, but that he didn't see an immediate

Mayor Pro-Tem Cathy Prout echoed Givens's concern. She also said that the hiring was a little premature. At the end of the question period, the item was not put up for a vote.

In other council action, Mayor Givens presented a proclamation to the Shafter Cinco de Mayo Festival Committee and its Grand Marshal Diana Burnett for their dedication and hard work putting together the festival this year.

"Diana Burnett, over her career, served a number of assignments for the Shafter Police Department, including the DARE program, field training officer, reserve officer coordinator and trainer, and also worked criminal investigations and supervised criminal investigations conducted by detectives," Givens said. "I present this proclamation to Diana Burnett for her dedication and service to the Shafter community and congratulate her as the 2024 Cinco de Mayo Festival Grand Marshal."

In addition, the council also approved uyp to \$15,000 to purchase trees for the city's Urban Greening Project. The trees would be planted in the city's parks, including Veterans Park and Mannel Park. They also will be planted along Lerdo Highway to act as a barrier to dust. The funding is coming from a \$75,000 grant from the Urban Greening Emissions Reduction Program, through the California Air Resources Board.

City hopes to make vet banners affordable

The city plans to make the Veteran Salute Banner Program more accessible after Councilmember Vincent Martinez brought to the City Council's attention that the current cost of the banners might be prohibitive to some veterans in the community.

"The city supports our veterans, and we want to honor them in the best way possible," Councilmember Martinez told his colleagues Tuesday night at their regular

The banner program celebrates honorably discharged veterans and presently serving active-duty military personnel from any branch of the United States Armed Forces. Banners featuring the service member's name, military branch, years of service and photo are set to adorn streetlight posts throughout downtown Wasco along 7th Street from Indepen-

dence Day through Veteran's Day.

To better improve the program, councilmembers discussed some options. They provided guidance to staff who will bring back new procedures for the program including the ability for citizens to donate for a particular banner or to the program in general. Donated funds may be used to help with the initial cost of a banner and to defray the cost of ongoing maintenance and replacement of aging banners. The council also favors honoring the city's employees who are veterans with a banner.

Councilmember Gilberto Reyna said, "The Veteran Salute Banner Program is a profound symbol of our community's respect and gratitude towards our brave armed forces and a testament to the courage and sacrifice of our veterans. I'm proud to celebrate our veterans' service and actively support this program."

The current banner application cycle closes at the end of April. Once approved, the improved procedures will take effect within the next year's cycle. Visit www. cityofwasco.org for more information on the banner program.

Also, at the meeting, the council reviewed and approved a mural concept for the east wall of a building located at 1140 7th Street. The owners, Jenny and Tilo Cortez, are working with Wasco High School art teachers and students to paint a mural on the side wall of their business, California Home Pros.

"A mural was always our vision for that wall. We didn't know the city had plans to beautify downtown when we bought and started rehabbing the building. We are very excited about what's to come with the downtown beautification project. We hope that our building and the finished mural will add to the aesthetic," Jenny Cortez said.

Community Development Director

Kerri Cobb said, "Public Art is an integral part of the overall improvements being made in downtown Wasco, and we are pleased that a local business and property owner has stepped up and decided to beautify his building with a mural."

Of the students who are painting the mural, she added, "Involving our youth in a project is a great way to give them a meaningful hands-on experience and sense of pride and accomplishment."

laugh and always tried to help people. She was a loving person. She especially showed us as siblings to love and take care

He said she was great with kids. "She loved the little ones, and they loved her. She was like a magnet to them. They were attracted to her love. One word to describe her would be love."

Jovita worked seasonally in the fields with the family as a migrant farmworker, picking cotton, grapes, potatoes and peaches. Daughter Rachel Martinez said, "She took us with her. We lived in a tent."

Though they lived humble lives, she said, "I didn't feel bad. We were happy with the way we lived. She taught me to appreciate what we had. I'll miss most about her is her smile, her laughter and always wanting to be hugged."

Linda Sanchez Muñiz added that her mother was full of wisdom, "She said once to me, if you don't work, you don't eat. If you want something, you have to work for it."

"Another thing that stuck out to me about my mom was cleanliness. She taught us even though we were poor, we didn't have to live dirty. I also loved her cooking. She showed me how to make tortillas, frijoles, sopa, whatever we had, she would teach us to cook. To me, she prepared us for life the best she could.'

Linda said Jovita cared deeply for her many grandchildren. "She loved them all the same. She was very hands-on and affectionate and liked to hug, kiss and pray

Another daughter, Pamela Venegas, said, "My mom was always busy cooking and cleaning, and she used to work housekeeping to make extra money. She also made sure we went to church and sent us to St. John's Catholic School for eight "As a mother, she was very affectionate,

and she did the best with what she knew, instilling in us a good work ethic and trust in God. Three of us are pastors, and she influenced that. My mother was a prayer

"I think she would like us to remember her for the love she gave us, the prayer she prayed for us and the joy she brought to our family."

Her son Michael Sanchez shared that Jovita was a woman of faith. "She was very religious and devoted to Jesus Christ, the Virgin Mary and Padre Pio. She would make hundreds of rosaries to send to New York, which would then be sent all over "I always followed her footsteps, attend-

ing church every Sunday and thanking the good Lord for what I have and what he's done for me. She was not a strict mother but understanding helping me with whatever she could and supporting me." Mathew Grijalba, her great-great grandson, said, "No matter who was

around her, she had a very loving presence. She had a place in her heart for you. Even in her later stages in life, she was a very outgoing person.' Daughter Dolores Gutierrez cared for

Jovita for 25 years and said it was a rewarding experience. "She loved me, and I could love her the same." Some of Jovita's favorite things to do

included going to the beach and watching sports on TV. "She loved to eat, and it was always a special treat to go out and eat Chinese food. When she was younger, she enjoyed sewing and, as she grew older, enjoyed

visiting her children. She loved to read re-

"She was very kind and always made sure that everybody had something to eat. As a wife, she did her household duties, cared for my dad, planned our vacations and was very accommodating." "We would go to Pismo Coast Village

and stay for a month. The whole family would go. There was a pool, a rec hall and an arcade. We had a great time. She would get in the pool with us and drink coffee around the campfire." As her caretaker for all those years she

said, "I feel lucky that I was the one that was blessed to have been able to have watched her.'

Shafter man, 51, killed in crash

The Kern County Coroner's Office has identified the victim of a fatal accident on Lerdo Highway on Friday, April 12.

At around 2:05 a.m., 51-year-old Tabass Zebadee Grandison-Mendoza, of Shafter, reportedly was driving in a sedan that struck a tree on East Lerdo High-

Grandison-Mendoza was traveling westbound on East Lerdo Highway, just north of Cherry Avenue, when the accident occurred.

He was pronounced dead at the scene. Lerdo Highway was closed for several hours as the road was cleaned up and an investigation was begun. The coroner's report said that the driver seemed to veer off of the roadway, crashing into the tree. No cause has been identified for the accident, awaiting toxicology reports and further testing.

Arts funding a focus at WUHSD meeting

Last week, Director of Programs Sunni Dobbs briefed the Wasco Union High School District WASCO

board on the Arts and Music in Schools Funding Guarantee and Accountability Act.

California voters approved Proposition 28 in 2022, The measure required the state to establish a new ongoing program supporting arts instruction in schools beginning in 2023-24, with three years to spend the first annual apportionment (2025-2026 school year).

Public schools (K-12) receive funding every July, equal to approximately 1% of the (K-12) Proposition 98 apportionment and is then dispersed to eligible schools. It is in addition to the allotted Prop 98 monies for schools.

The WUHSD 2023-24 Prop 28 allocation is \$331,170.

Proposition 28 requires that 80% of the money be used to hire new certified or classified staff or retain staff to teach something new within the arts programs. No more than 1% of the allocation can be spent on administrative costs. The remain-

ing funds (19%) can be used for training,

supplies and materials and arts education partnership programs.

Monies cannot be spent on any current arts, music, drama, multimedia courses or staff already in place. Funding must be used to increase art education for all stu-

WUHSD currently offers fine arts, music, drama and multimedia courses. Dobbs said the next steps are that WUHSD will review the current course offerings to all students and apportionments granted to each school. A review will be conducted to determine what courses or programs could potentially be added to enhance current pathways or enrich student opportunities by adding additional courses that have not currently been explored.

"I think access to the arts as part of an overall educational curriculum has historically been important. However, with the rising interest in science/engineering programs, the arts seem to have taken a back seat. With Prop 28, CA schools will have access to funds specifically designed to grow new arts programs. Wasco High already offers cutting-edge visual, multi-media, and culinary arts programs, so I'm excited to see how our team will leverage this new funding to serve our students even better," board member Juan Bernal

Also, at the board meeting, WUHSD Superintendent Kevin Tallon highlighted the accomplishments of the SkillsUSA students who competed at the 2024 California State SkillsUSA Conference, held earlier this month in Ontario..

SkillsUSA is a student-run organization that collaborates with businesses and trade programs to train students in personal skills, workplace skills and leadership to fill high-demand job positions. Wasco High School's program focuses on technical skills grounded in academics and multimedia, construction, culinary, allied health and public safety.

Special congratulations for taking gold in television [video] production to Andrew Montano Lopez and Zahid Soto and taking gold in t-shirt design was Crecensiano Gonzalez. Jocelyn Uribe also won a medal for taking silver in the masonry competition."

"Participating in the SkillsUSA State Competition provided Wasco High School students and advisors invaluable learning experiences and opportunities for personal and professional growth. Beyond honing technical skills, the competition fostered teamwork, leadership and problem-solving skills. Thank you to Mr. Danny Eusebio, Mr. Jimmy Martinez, Mrs. Tiffany McCurdy, Mr. Pablo Montano, Ms. Laura Penaloza and CTE Coordinator Jeanette Mercado and congratulations on a job well done."

From small beginnings to High-Speed Rail contracts

J. Perez Transport, Inc. has operated since 1998 and, in 2018, experienced a big boost in business after winning a contract with California High-Speed Rail . Now in business doing a little bit of everything, according to owner Juan Perez, Jr., the company continues to thrive with hopes of garnering even more opportunities for growth.

Perez was awarded 17 miles from Wasco to the Garces Highway to construct the HSR. He accomplished this feat through confidence and a determined mindset.

"I walked into the office of the project manager for the HSR in Wasco when I was told they were looking for small businesses, but mine was too small. I only had three trucks, but I told him I could get more small owner-operator businesses like mine if he gave me the opportunity. He gave me an opportunity by saying, "If you can come up with 25 more like yourself by tomorrow with phone numbers I can call to confirm, I will take it to higher management and get you on board." freight cross-country. The company is family-owned, with his wife, Vicky, running the office and his brother, Joel Perez, help-


ing out with bigger projects. Perez has lived in Wasco for 22 years and said, "It's a great little town."



At the State tournament, sister Janali placed second, along with Julian, in their respective weight divisions.


The medals continue to accumulate with the success of the siblings, creating a dynasty here, putting Shafter on the wrestling Mother Esmeralda said that

("Grantee") a 20-year non-exclusive franchise ("Franchise"), replacing Ordinance F-464, to construct, install, maintain, inspect, operate, repair, renew and remove a non-public utility pipeline together with the appurtenances and equipment necessary or convenient for operation thereof. The nominal internal diameter of the pipeline, rounded to the closest inch, shall not exceed sixteen (16) inches. The principal purpose of the franchise is the transport of irrigation water. The requested franchise covers all areas in and under any and all public highways, public roads or rights of way now or hereafter dedicated to public use for roadway purposes and expressly accepted and/or declared public highways by the County (including, but not limited to, the Kern County right of way for Scaroni Avenue and Burbank Street), which are within the County of Kern, and are within Sections 19, 20, 29 and 30, Township 28 South, Range 25 East, M.D.B..M., but not included within the limits of an incorporated

Throughout the term of the franchise the Grantee and its successors or assigns shall pay to the County of Kern ("County") an annual fee equivalent to \$.15 times the linear foot of each pipeline installed in the County right of way, regardless of the size of the pipeline. This franchise fee shall be adjusted annually throughout the term pursuant to Section 8 of the ordinance. Grantee shall file with the designated agent of the Board of Supervisors, within three months after the expiration of the calendar year or fractional calendar year following the date of the granting of the franchise and within three months after the expiration of each calendar year thereafter, a detailed and verified statement showing the used location (by road name or number and section, township and range), length (expressed in feet) and actual internal size (expressed in inches) of all of Grantee's pipelines situated within the County right of way. Grantee shall pay to the County, within 15 days after the time for filing the statement described hereinabove, in lawful money of the United States, the annual fee due. Any neglect, omission or refusal by Grantee to file the verified statement, or to pay the franchise fee at the time or in the manner provided, shall make the Grantee subject to penalties as detailed in Sections 11, 13, and 14 of Ordinance constitutes grounds for declaration of forfeiture of the franchise and of all rights thereafter. Joy in salvation by faith

PASTOR SPENCER CARPENTER

First Southern Baptist Church, Shafter

What do you have to do to be right with God? How can unrighteous guilty sinners be made right before a perfect and holy God? Every person knows they fall short of their own standards of right and wrong, and have some sense of the righteousness of God. Often people think about if they were to stand before God right now, what would happen, what kind of evaluation would they face?

The biblical teaching on justification explains the only way to be made right in God's eyes is by faith in Jesus Christ's sin-bearing work on the cross. To be right with God is not based on works by trying to cover up the bad we have done with the good, like balancing scales. The Bible says our works are like filthy rags (Isaiah 64:6).

We need our sins forgiven and to be seen by God in Jesus Christ, the only one who lived a perfect and sinless life as the Son of God (Isaiah 1:18; Acts 10:43; 2 Corinthians 5:21).

Justification or being declared righteous before God is truly good news. Justification from the Bible is God's declaration of "righteous" or "not guilty" for those who have faith in Jesus Christ and His sacrifice for sins (Romans 3:21-26). Like in a courtroom scene where we know we are guilty of our sins, but we trust in Christ personally and have our sins paid for by His sacrifice, then we stand before God righteous in Christ. The righteousness from Christ's sacrifice is transferred to the believer's account and while his or her personal sins are attributed to Jesus' sin-covering sacrifice (Romans 3:21-26; 4:1-5:1; Galatians 2:16-3:14).

Faith is the sole basis for justification or the declaration of righteousness by God (John 3:16; Romans 3:20; Galatians 2:16). Faith is belief or personal trust in Jesus Christ and His atoning work in His life, death, and resurrection (Acts 16:31; Romans 10:9-10; 1 Corinthians 15:3-4). Justification means salvation from the guilt and penalty of sin and is an instantaneous act of God that happens for the believer upon conversion. The guilty sinner's record is cleared with his sins being transferred to Christ's sacrifice and he stands guiltless before God the righteous Judge. God then declares the once guilty sinner "not guilty" based on the sacrifice of Jesus Christ (Romans 8:1).

Salvation is by faith and not by works, which is grace where eternal life is given freely to all (Rom 4:2-5; 6:23; 11:6; Ephesians 2:8-9; Titus 3:5). The relationship

between faith and works is that true faith leads to works of righteousness done out of thanksgiving and love for God; they do not in any way earn salvation, but genuine faith produces good works (James 2:14-26).

Understanding justification or salvation by faith alone has a tremendous impact on the believer's everyday life. Too many Christians are still on the treadmill of works, thinking salvation is somehow dependent on living perfect lives and heaping up good works. But this is exhausting and impossible. Truly understanding salvation by faith alone means Christians are confident, peaceful, hopeful, thankful, and joyful in their salvation (Romans 5:1-2). Romans 8:1 says, "There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus." Amen! This is truly good news worth sharing!


Marina will definitely be missed by her close
