New James St. bus stop on the move

The Shafter City Council approved a portion of the James Street project that will see the Regional Transit Bus Stop relocated from the corner of the City Hall location to Stringham Park, right off of James Street.

The project is made possible by cooperation between the City of Shafter and the Kern County Public Works Department.

Shafter Public Works Director Michael James said that the project is part of the

approved 2022/2023 budget, which earmarked monies for the project.

Although construction has begun, they are now waiting on the relocation of a bus shelter to the Stringham Park location. This also includes a new parking lot at the site, which will be on the Lerdo Highway side of Stringham Park.

The relocation does have its fans. Reggie Reinhold, who rides the bus regularly, said that the move would be a good one.

"That intersection where the bus stop is now is kind of crazy. It is right off of Central Valley Highway, and the traffic goes so fast down that road. I will feel a lot more comfortable and safe with the bus stop being at the park."

The Shafter City Council approved the purchase of a new bus shelter, which is a pre-fabricated structure that will provide shelter and shade for bus riders as they wait. Cen-Cal Construction was approved to do the relocation of the building, with a low bid of \$67,000. This was approved by the council in May.

Previously, the council approved a project that would build a new transit bus bay turnout on James Street, adjacent to Stringham Park. Upon completion of the project, the county has agreed to relocate its Regional Transit Bus Stop in Shafter to the Stringham Park location.

James said that this new location will be an ideal spot for the Regional Transit Bus. "This will be a better option for the site, freeing up a lot of space around the City Hall buildings."

The City Council serves as the legislative and policymaking body of the city, formulating city policy, approving new programs and services, appropriating funds, and generally supervising the operations of city government.

The City Council leads a unique strategic planning effort each year to determine important issues and set overall goals for the city that year. This project is led by the communitywide vision project conducted in 1996, which involved 3,000 residents.

Through the leadership of Mayor Gilberto Reyna and the City Council, the City of Wasco will again provide all Wasco residents vaccinated at this clinic with a \$50 Visa gift card.

"I anticipate a bigger crowd will show up to get their Visa gift cards.

Because of the new Omicron BA.5 subvariant infections increasing, I want to encourage everyone able to vaccinate to do so," said Mayor Reyna.

"Many of those vaccinated at our June 26th clinic would now qualify for their next dose. If you received a Visa gift card the first time at this event, returning for your follow-up dose will also earn you the opportunity for another Visa gift card.

"That keeps moving our vaccina-

tion percentages upward, and that is what I want," said Mayor Reyna.

The Visa gift cards will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis.





1-year-old dies in suspected DUI crash

A Wasco man is under investigation after being involved in a traffic accident that resulted in the death of a 1-year-old child and the injury of five others.

Irving Rodriguez-Barraza was reportedly driving a Dodge Ram eastbound on Burbank Street when it collided with a Jeep Cherokee driven by Bakersfield resident Jesus Tejada Sanchez, 29. Rodriguez-Barraza had a passenger with him, Cruz Carrillo Olvera, 48, of Wasco. Sanchez had an adult passenger, Joanne Figueroa, 34, and two children, 1 and 4

They were traveling on Shafter Avenue approaching Burbank Street on Saturday afternoon at about 4:30 p.m. Rodriguez-

Barraza is suspected of running the stop sign at the intersection and crashed into the left side of the Jeep, pushing it into an almond orchard, according to California Highway Patrol officials. The accident resulted in a power outage, with customers without power for several hours.

The Jeep hit two power poles and an almond tree before turning over on its left side. The Dodge Ram hit a stop sign.

The 1-year-old child was pronounced dead at the scene. Five other victims were taken to area hospitals for treatment.

Rodriguez-Barraza is under investigation of being under the influence at the time of the accident. The investigation is ongo-

Wrestling teaches life skills

Since 2009, Wasco Families Wrestling has empowered young people through SHAFTER the sport.

Thousands of students have benefited from the program, instilling in them the importance of education and inspiring them to work hard at their goals. Vice President Juan Gallardo started

his career as a wrestler at the early age of nine in elementary and later as a junior and senior in high school. In his first year of college, he became a coach. "I have been a coach going on 27

"It is a challenge to take kids who don't know how to wrestle and turn them into wrestlers. This means you must always believe in them, even when they struggle to believe in themselves," Gallardo said.

As a coach, he strives to unlock the potential that the athletes never knew thev had.

"It is fun to see their eyes open with joy knowing they did something they thought they couldn't do."

Gallardo serves as a father figure and mentor.

"I wear a lot of hats. I discipline them, treat them with respect and hold them accountable, like focusing on their homework. We talk about

student-athletes and stress how to be good people in this world by showing them to be supportive teammates, honor their parents and teachers and be responsible."

"I also work with their probation officers, as some of our kids have gotten in trouble with the law. For many of these, we have turned around their lives," said Gallardo.

The team is composed of both boys and girls. There is a youth program for ages 5 to 13 and a high school program for ages 14 to 18.

He has a strong team of coaches and assistant coaches with over 97 years of combined experience.

The head coach for the girls is Joe Blanchard; the assistant coach is Danny Arellano, who is the principal at Thomas Jefferson Middle School.

For the boys, Gallardo is the head coach, and his assistant coaches are Garth Wara and Anselmo Arellano, Danny Arellano's son.

There is an average of 35 students rticipating, and they work hard all year long.

"We practice during the season five days a week for two and a half hours. During the off-season, we are in the wrestling room three to four days a week for two hours and then an hour of weights."

They train at the Wasco High School campus wrestling room.

"They have built a beautiful mat

room. It is gorgeous," said Gallardo. During the year, they participate in clinics and tournaments and work out at different clubs, including in Fresno,

Clovis, Bakersfield and Delano. All his students are outstanding, but a few that stand out have attained the title of All-American by placing at national tournaments.

These would include his son Juan David Gallardo (13), Coby Clark (17), Julieta Aispuro (16) and Arecely Gomez (17).

He considers Iris Aguero, 15, as the most talented of them all.

"She does Judo and different styles of Taekwondo and has competed all over the country, even competing against adults," said Gallardo.

Others have competed and won titles at national tournaments, like Rasco Carreno (15), Pascual Millan (17), Fabian Vera (17), Carlos Acosta (17) and Michael Rogers (15).

Recently, Gallardo was presented with a certificate of recognition from Mayor Gilberto Reyna and the council.

"I felt honored and was blessed to

accept the award." He said he is humble and is someone that just wants to have a positive

impact on these young kids. Wasco Families Wrestling tries to serve an important purpose in the

community. "We are the muscle of Wasco and help clean up garages and alleys, cut weeds, put up Christmas lights and move people from one house to another. We also assist women who have lost their husbands, and at weddings and birthdays, we set up chairs and tables, staying behind to do all the dishes."

The price to enroll is very afford-

able. "We offer one of the county's lowest costs and also give scholarships. There is help with uniforms and entry fees for competitions," said Gallardo. "We try to give every family a chance because we know some struggle.





Kern County Public Works will host their Shafter-Wasco One-Day Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event on Saturday, Aug. 13, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Shafter-Wasco Sanitary Landfill, 17621 Scofield Ave., in Shafter. It is a free event.

Residents will be able to properly and safely dispose of their hazardous waste. Types of hazardous waste accepted include automotive products and fluids, batteries, household cleaners, over-the-counter expired or no-use-for medications, fluorescent bulbs and old medical use syringes. icals, which the State of California prohibits dumping in a solid waste landfill.

There are rules to follow when transporting waste to the event: one must label all containers, have no leaking containers, no ammunition or explosives, and do not mix wastes. The transport of more than 15 gallons or 125 pounds of waste per trip is not allowed. "These restrictions are in place to prevent chemical spill and or environmental contamination."


