Wasco grad battled through segregation in his childhood

The Wasco Tribune Growing up in the 1950s, segre-

gation was a part of everyday life for John Miller.

"I attended segregated schools beginning with Dunbar School in Vado, New Mexico," Miller, who currently resides in Bakersfield, said. "I then went to Booker T. Washington School in Las Cruces and finally to George Washington Carver School in Eloy, Arizona. When we finally moved to Wasco, I went to Thomas Jefferson Middle School and then Wasco High."

He only went to school with Black

students and had Black teachers up

until he moved to Arizona. When he lived there, at the time integrating the schools was a major topic of conversation in the United States, but only three families in his school were willing to integrate. The principal of his school along with three teachers protested to the Arizona state legislature that they did not want to integrate their schools.

He had a very different life than many children because he worked one or more jobs from the time he was 5 years old. "I worked in the fields before and after school and in the summers," he said.

"I am the fourth of 10 children," Miller said. "When I was in school, I wanted to play sports, but someone accidentally put my older sister's birthday on my registration. It took a while but I finally got it fixed and was able to play sports."

Miller went on to graduate from

Davis served in the U.S. Air Force from

June 1971 to May 1975. He attended weapons school in Colorado for 10 months and was a control systems specialist, maintaining weapons systems on F-4 jet fighters.

Davis was sent to Da Nang, Vietnam in April 1972. However, President Richard Nixon was negotiating the return of

all American soldiers and Davis was sent back to the states in October 1972. It was the end of the war in Vietnam. Davis left the Air Force

an E-4 Sergeant and is a member of VFW Post 6742. After his tour was over,

Davis went to college at

San Jose State where he obtained his degrees in engineering and business administration. He also earned a master's degree in education. Davis worked for Avantek — a bay area military subcontractor — that made

defense weapon program systems. He was there for 15 years where he worked on B-2 bombers. After Hewlett Packard bought Avantek, Davis returned to Wasco and decided to go into education. He taught math at Thom-

as Jefferson Middle School

where Davis was eventually promoted to principal. He retired in 2018 and has spent the last two years traveling with his wife.

Davis said that he got out of teaching at just the right time – before the pandemic.



"Teachers are forced to learn a new way of teaching digitally," he said. "They have to learn new software and then turn around and have to teach their students a completely new way." He said that it is a new learning curve

thrust upon teachers.

Davis just returned from a trip to Idaho where he went deer hunting and steelhead fishing. He also traveled to the Carlsbad Caverns, "which I've always wanted to see," he said. He and his wife were able to take a trip

to Rome, France, Spain and the Mediterra-They had planned on leaving for Austra-

lia and New Zealand this fall.

Through the USDA Summer Seamless Feeding Option waiver, the Richland School District has been providing meals to children ages 2 to 18 on weekdays. Families have been utilizing the drive-thru service at three of the school campuses as well as at bus stops and through a mobile delivery

Lead by Angie Armstrong and Doricela Chavolla, Redwood Elementary and Richland Junior High staff have been providing packages to 1,050 to 1,125 students. Between 250 to 400 cars pass through the drive-thru from noon to 1:30 p.m. Staff is split between an early morning group and a mid-morning group to maintain social dis-mentary and Richland Junior High include every child in need of a nutritious meal.

Throughout the district, over 50 Nutritional Services, Maintenance & Operations, Transportation and School Sit staff team up to make sure families have food during the pandemic crisis while students are using distance learning. Safety and sanitation practices are followed.



The infection rate is dropping and Kern County has met one criteria to be placed in the Orange Tier on Gov. Gavin Newsom's four-tier chart.

The four-tier system runs from purple (most at risk) to red to orange to yellow (least at risk.) The county is currently in the red tier.

The Public Health Department reported on Tuesday, Oct. 27, that Kern County's numbers were lowering and the county had met one of the metrics necessary to move up to the

orange tier.

Comparing Shafter and Wasco numbers, Shafter has 1,326 total cases with 691 patients recovered and 249 patients presumed recovered in a population of 20,710 people. Wasco has a total of 1,613 total cases with 636 patients fully recovered and 232 patients presumed recovered in a total population of 27,552 people.

Public Health Director Matt Constantine said that the rate of positive tests is at 4.4%, which is lower than it has been and

meets the orange tier. Kern County needs to lower the daily case rate and the health equity metric before it can move into the orange

The county recommends if you have been exposed to someone with a case of covid-19, you should know the incubation of two to 14 days. You need to quarantine for two weeks, whether or not you feel sick or not during that time frame.

You should get tested at the Wasco Library or where your primary care physician recommends you get tested during that 14-day period.

Covid-19 tests are not necessarily accurate because a person could have a false-positive test or a falsenegative test. Everyone should get tested after they have been exposed.

In most cases, a patient needs to do what his/her doctor recommends. If you get tested immediately after you've been exposed, it's likely your test will not come out accurate. You have to have a certain viral count within your body in order to test positive.

Everyone is recommended to contact their doctor if you have any symptoms of the virus.

Passed over again for ballot location

It is becoming a sad commentary for Shafter residents to see their city ignored when it comes to services in Kern County. I received a few phone calls from residents who were not happy with Shafter being passed over for a ballot location when the sites were recently announced. There are more than a dozen locations throughout Kern County in each community it seems, except for Shafter and McFarland. These ballot locations make it

possible for residents to turn in their ballots without having to put them in the mail. A large number of Kern County residents want to drop their ballots off themselves, not leaving their fate in someone else's hands.

I called the Elections Department of Kern County and was transferred to their media liaison, Laura Cantu. There was no answer and I left a detailed message for her and awaited a response. I ended up leaving Cantu four messages with not one response. It was déjà vu all over again. I looked at the locations that were announced that would be available, including one in Wasco, Delano, Ridgecrest, Lake Isabella, Taft and couple in Bakersfield. All of the locations on the list were libraries dotted throughout the county, libraries that the county had deemed worthy to reopen recently.

This announcement was surprising, considering that Shafter, being one of the smallest branches in the county of the 24 libraries, was always ranked near the top when it comes to participation and foot traffic. Even the Wasco branch, which is a very nice library, was reopened even though it doesn't come close to the numbers put up by the Shafter

After several failed attempts of trying to contact Cantu, I called and was told that Cantu was very busy and they could not tell her who to respond to and who not to. I finally emailed Elections@KernCounty. com and received a reply from Mary Bedard of the Kern County Auditor-Controller's Office within an hour. I was told that the drop-off locations were determined in conjunction with the libraries, and which branches were open and could accommodate it. She also said that since there were two locations in Bakersfield and one in Wasco, that they needed to allocate their scarce resources to areas of the county where voters would have to go much greater distances to drop off their ballots.

This makes no sense to me because a person living in Bakersfield can use public transportation to get to the drop-off location, even if there was just one location in the city. But, a resident of Shafter will have to find a way to Wasco to drop off their ballot, which would be the closest location for them. This is a burden for a lot of residents and is just another slap in the face in addition to the remaining closure of its library branch, which seems to be the reason we were not deemed worthy of a drop-off location. Hopefully, Shafter will show those officials how they feel by the way they vote in this election. Yes, kick us while we are already down. Thank God that there is a possibility of a partnership with Bakersfield College that might mean a bright future for our library. We might just keep thriving in spite of the no confidence vote we seem to be getting from our beloved county leaders.




Wasco High School in 1958. He shared one of his fondest memories from Wasco High.

WHAT IS BEING PROPOSED?

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) would like feedback on a Draft Removal Action Workplan (RAW) for the PCE Plume Investigation (Site) in downtown Delano, California, 93215. The RAW describes the environmental studies that have been conducted at the Site and activities proposed to remediate soils that are impacted by volatile organic compounds (VOCs) that include Tetrachloroethylene (PCE) and Trichloroethylene (TCE). These chemicals have been used as degreasers or solvents at dry cleaners and other industries and are known by the State of California to cause cancer.

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) CEQA This state law requires the lead agency of a project to consider and disclose the environmental effects of its proposed actions before project approval. As a responsible agency under CEQA, DTSC evaluated if this project would be subject to CEQA. DTSC has determined with certainty that there is no possibility that the activities in question may have a significant effect on the environment because the project would not result in "a substantial, or potentially substantial, adverse change in any of the physical conditions within the area affected by the project, including land, air, water, minerals, flora, fauna, ambient noise, and objects of historic or aesthetic



COUCH'S CORNER Code Compliance

DAVID COUCH District 4 Supervisor

To protect public health and community standards in District 4, my

office works in partnership with Kern County Code Compliance to mitigate land use violations, public nuisances, and violations of property

Taking proactive measures to reduce safety hazards ensure our friends and neighbors have an equitable living standard. Kern County Code Compliance provides a uniform procedure for code enforcement that ensures all residents of Kern County are equally represented.

Supporting the Kern County Public Works Department develop techniques to obtain compliance with adopted regulations from the Board of Supervisors remains a priority of mine. We as a community must work together to safeguard the investments our community members make into their property and neighborhoods. Taking common sense approaches to bring properties in compliance with county ordinances preserve the appearance and property values of a neighbor-

Code compliance officers enforce several regulations related to the Kern County Code of Ordinances. Examples of regulations enforced by KC Code Compliance include:

Illegal dumping. (KC Solid Waste Code Violation § 8.28.080)

Construction without building permits. (KC Building Code Violation §17.08.03) Open and/or

structure(s). (KC Housing Code Violation § 1001.4) Abandoned and/or inoperable vehicles. (KC Abandoned Vehicle Code

Violation § 10.28.040) Operation of a business without land use approval (KC Zoning Code

Violation § 19.02.060) Excessive storage of non-permitted, miscellaneous items. (KC Solid Waste Code Violation § 8.28.110)

Structure has become an attractive nuisance to children and/or a harbor to vagrants. (KC Uniform Code for Abatement of Dangerous Buildings §

Keep in mind that Kern County strives to gain cooperation and voluntary compliance from the community before code compliance officers take enforcement action.

After receiving a complaint or observing code violations, code compliance officers document the violation with a written report and photographs. Upon completion of the initial document the property owner is sent a personal notification describing the details of the code violation, time frame to correct the violation, and the enforcement actions taken if the violation is not mitigated. Upon receiving a courtesy letter from KC Code Compliance, the property owner has 14 days to abate violation. If the violation is not abated the property owner receives a 30-day Notice and Order to abate before the issuance of fines or abatement by contractors hired by the

Choosing not to comply with the 30-day Notice and Order will result in an initial fine of \$250. If the pattern continues, the property owner will receive a second fine of \$500 and a third fine of \$1000. Please keep in mind that the administrative process for citations strives to gain compliance, not generate revenue. Also property owners have the right to appeal actions taken by Code Compliance with the Kern County Board of Supervisor. However, after a decision has been rendered by the Board, the property owner has 30 days to comply with the resolution approved by the Board of Supervisors. By working together we can


