The Shafter Generals opened their 2019 campaign with a victory against the Mira Monte Lions 37-22 on Friday night. It was not a pretty win, but it counts the same as a

Showing opening night jitters, sophomore quarterback Tyson Dohzier and the General offense had trouble getting on track in the first half, with several miscues that stalled promising drives.

In the first minute of the game, Shafter gained big on the first two plays of the game before a fumble gave the Lions the ball in General territory. Two plays later, the Generals were behind for the first time in a regular season game in



over a year. With the score 7-0, the Generals couldn't sustain the drive on their next possession, giving the ball back to the Lions. At approximately 9 p.m., they were able to track Gonzalez to a residence in Shafter. Officers surrounded the house, and Gonzalez was called out. He surrendered peacefully. He was taken into custody without incident and then transported back to Tulare Police Department for the booking process.

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LOOKING BACK IN LOCAL HISTORY

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Wiedmann: Veteran, pharmacist, citizen

This story was written for a California State University, Bakersfield, class assignment by Arnold Martinez, who grew up in Shafter.

n today's fast paced world, it's easy to forget the major events that took place in the mid-20th century which changed the world forever. There are several estimates as far as the death tolls are concerned, but experts agree that the totals were between 65 million and 95 million worldwide, including civilians. History has been my passion since I was a boy; I've been described by people who are closest to me as being an "old soul." I spent mediately told me not to be nervous, that we were "just friends, talking." The instant that he said those words, I felt a huge relief, and I felt like I was chatting with a lifelong friend. I told him that I held all veterans in high regard, but World War II veterans are in a separate place of their own. I could easily write a book and try to explain the admiration and respect that I have for these men, but I'm afraid that even a book would not be enough to get my message across. To me, the men and women of America's Greatest Generation are truly unique. I eventually settled down, and what I thought was going to be a 15-minute inter-

through high school listening to Bing Crosby, Dean Martin and Frank Sinatra, as opposed to rap or alternative, which most kids my age listened to.

I grew up in Shafter. Although many people do not know it, Shafter played a crucial role training combat pilots during World War II. Minter Air Field in Shafter was used as a training facility by the United States Army Air Corps, and pilots were trained in anything from Vultee B-13 Valiant to Lockheed P-38 Lightnings. There are people from Shafter who played a very important role in our nation's noble cause during the war; their service was unselfish, brave and should

never be forgotten. I have read (literally) hundreds of books relating to World War II, but I had never actually interviewed a World War II Veteran. My father-in-law set up an "interview" between myself and a man he knew who grew up in Shafter, named Merton Lynn Wiedmann.

The single word "nervous" does not even begin to describe the way that I felt when I arrived at his front door; the amount of respect and admiration that I have for Our Greatest Generation cannot be put into words. I shook hands with Mert, introduced myself and tried to calm my nerves before asking him any questions. He must have noticed how nervous I was, because he initiated the conversation as I scrambled through my papers, looking for a proper

first question, I must have cleared my throat three or four times. Mert im-

question to ask him.

long conversation (one of the greatest conversations I've ever had).

Mert was born on April 16, 1924, in Shafter, where he went to school and worked in the farming fields as a young boy. He explained to me that he was not of any privilege, and the entire family worked hard to earn money, just to get by. Mert was a

17-year-old senior at Shafter High School when he heard the news of the devastating attack on Pearl Harbor by the Empire of Japan on Sunday, Dec. 7, 1941. It amazed me to hear him say that on Dec. 8 the entire student body at Shafter High School was in the gymnasium for a general assembly listening to the broadcast when President Franklin Delano Roosevelt declared war on the Empire of Japan. Some high school students would only go to school half of the day and go to work in the fields the other half, to earn money for their families. Mert was the president of the student body at Shafter High

ated in June of 1942. He enlisted in the Navy on Dec. 7, 1942, exactly one year after the attack on Pearl Harbor.

A lot had happened in a year; on Dec. 11, 1941, Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy declared war on the United States, siding with the Japan Empire. The Japanese had been advancing in the Pacific, and gaining momentum through May of 1942. On May 4-8, 1942, the Battle of the Coral Sea took place East of New Guinea. This was a decisive battle, and it changed the tide in the Pacific in favor of the Allies. Although the Japanese sank more ships than they lost, it was a strategic victory for the Allies, because it was the first time that a major Japanese assault had been stopped. Two Japanese fleet carriers were knocked out of the fight, Zuikaku and Shokaku; one was sunk and the other was badly damaged. The loss of these carriers was a huge blow for the Imperial Navy; it would greatly impact the outcome of the Battle of Midway, June 3-7, 1942. During the Battle of Midway, the skies were controlled by American planes, because the Japanese Navy had lost two of their aircraft carriers a month before at the Battle of the Coral Sea. The Battle of Midway was the turning point in the Pacific War; our Navy lost the carrier Yorktown and a destroyer, the Japanese Navy lost all four of its aircraft carriers, the Akagi, Kaga, Hiryu and Soryu, as well as a cruiser. On Aug. 7, 1942 the Guadalcanal Campaign began, and was still in progress, when Mert enlisted in

the Navy. Mert was sent to the University of Notre Dame for training. Some of the training that Mert received was in meteorology, intended to be used in the Pacific Theater. The Typhoon of 1944 was a tropical cyclone that hit the U.S. Pacific Fleet in December of 1944. The winds of the cyclone were said to have been over 100 mph. Over 790 American sailors were killed, three destroyers were sunk, nine war ships were damaged and over 100 aircraft were wrecked or blown overboard. Admiral Chester W. Nimitz described the results of the typhoon as "a more crippling blow to the Third

After his training at Notre Dame, Mert flew to Point Barrow, Alaska. Things were very different in the 1940s, and technolNavy officer. Ambulance Service announced details this week of its implementation of the new ZOLL Autopulse, making it the largest deployment in North America.

"This system will save many more lives than using manual CPR, allowing the blood flow to increase to about 30 percent to the brain," said Bryan Pank, senior EMS account executive with ZOLL Medical Corp.

The new systems have been placed into service on each Hall Ambulance Life Support and Basic Life Support ambulance in its 9-1-1 response area, including Shafter, Wasco and most of the rest of Kern County.

The device will also be carried onboard Hall Critical Care Transport's ground units. The ZOLL AutoPulse Resuscitation System helps to improve blood flow to the heart and brain during SCA because of the unique, high-quality chest compression it generates compared to manual CPR.







"It has been a crazy three months,"

When asked what, if any, improvements had been made since the big changes that occurred over a year ago when the majority of the administrators were reassigned, Romero said, "I really don't know why the changes were done, but we have adjusted. Change in anything is difficult, but we have made strides and work for our ultimate goal to give the children a quality education."

Romero started in 1989 as a teacher and taught for five years before beginning her career in administration. Since then, Romero has served at several different positions in the district, including being head of the migrant

program, director of curriculum and instruction, and principal of Redwood Elementary School, among others.

The next superintendent will face not only the challenges of improving on test scores and keeping the district moving forward, he or she also will have the challenge of a shrinking budget. When asked what impact the presence of Grimmway Academy has had on the district, Romero said, "First, it is the numbers. We operate and receive monies on how many students we have. The impact has been a maior hit to our numbers, and as a result, we are looking at having to cut staff. There will be some difficult decisions to be made because the numbers are not there. When numbers are down, we have to make those decisions to cut staff, including teachers and maybe even staff on the administrative level."

The district was looking at cutting programs in their LCAP a couple of years ago, but Romero said that programs such as CHAMPS, an afterschool program that has helped many students in their educational careers, are grant-funded, so they will stay in place. "We also still have the opportunity to give every student a free lunch, with no need for any paperwork or economic requirements."

Romero said that she will work hard while she is in her current position to help the district thrive and put together a plan that might carry over into the next administration.

End of fiscal emergency

The Board of Supervisors adopted the fiscal year 2019-20 budget on Tuesday. In addition, we also adopted a resolution declaring the end of the County of Kern's fiscal emergency. By the end of this fiscal year – June 30,

2020 -- the county will have addressed the structural deficit in the General Fund that occurred with the large drop in the price of oil in 2016 which, in turn, resulted in a large decrease in the property tax from oil-producing properties. Progress has also been made in addressing and mitigating the deficit in the Fire Fund. That work continues. Declaring the end of the fiscal emergen-

cy doesn't mean a start to wasteful spending. It doesn't mean there won't be challenges in the future. It doesn't mean an end to our LEAN/Six Sigma efforts that have produced savings and efficiencies across departments. A culture of continuous improvement and getting the most out of each hard-earned tax dollar must continue. It does mean that the county employ-

ees and the supervisors have done the hard work and made the tough decisions to address and confront our budget deficit. It means that in next year's budget, if, among other factors, our local and national economy continues on its current trajectory, the board will be able to replenish reserves that have been used. It means we will be able to consider cost-of-living adjustments for our employees that have patiently stuck with us. It means we will hopefully be able to address at least a few in a litany of major maintenance projects that have been deferred for many years. Fully mitigating the General Fund defi-

cit has been a difficult and often painstaking

achievement. Thanks are due to our current and former chief accounting officer, their staff, all of our department heads, all of our employees (some of the best people I've ever met) and all of our bargaining units for their patience and professionalism. Many of our service providers and suppliers have also stepped up to help the county through the last few difficult years. This is a great moment for Kern County.

We should take a little time to reflect on what we've been through and congratulate each another on completing the task.

Together, we did it.
