Illegal fireworks go viral

Police chief asks for help in video

An arrest was made over the weekend and three other cases were handed to the Kern County District Attorney's Office for investigation regarding a slew of illegal fireworks activity in and around Shafter.

Chief Kevin Zimmermann posted a video reaching out to the community for assistance in catching the perpetrators who have been inundating the community with a series of explosions, some strong enough to rattle windows. Shafter's pet population has also been thrown into chaos with the continuous explosions.

Zimmermann said that he does not know the reason for the uptick in illegal fireworks activity this year, but he said that it has been a bad year already. "I don't know if it is from people being cooped up due to the quarantine, or what, but this year has seen a big increase in the number of illegal fireworks being set off in town, and also the period of the activity is a lot longer."

Zimmermann said that the best defense they have against the activity is the involvement of the entire com-

The City Council unanimously approved a budget for 2020-21 that includes a WASCO \$1.3 million oper-

ating deficit.

The city's biggest expense is for safety (contracts with the Kern County Fire Department and Sheriff's Office), accounting for nearly a third of the budget.

The city will be paying more for the Kern County Fire Department contract to run for one more year and the contract for the Kern County Sheriff's Office will increase to almost \$4.1 million for 2020-2021. The KCSO contract expires June 30, 2021.

The General Fund budget shows that revenues will be \$14.6 million in 2020-21 and expenditures will be \$15.9 million, creating a \$1.3 million deficit.

Both the Kern County Fire Department and the Kern County Sheriff's Department contracts increased in cost to the city.

In his presentation, City Manager Daniel Ortiz-Hernandez said that the impact of Covid-19 on the city would include a decline in

The Shafter City Council held a Special meeting on Tuesday night and ap-

SHAFTER proved the budget for 2020-2021 with a unanimous vote.

The budget proposal was the same one that had been discussed over the past few weeks with minor changes.

The budget projects a 7.5% decrease in sales tax revenue, with there still being a chance, according to City Manager Gabriel Gonzales, of stronger performance because of the position of online retail sales, led by Williams Sonoma. The housewares company has a call center near Minter

Field. In one change to the final budget is the hiring of all four police officer positions that are vacant.

The two additional budget hirings will cost about \$200,000. Gonzales said that funds saved from other areas of the budget will pay

for the positions. In the budget summation, it was stated that many organizations take "use it or lose it" as a guide to spending, but it isn't here. It said

Graduations were different – but safe

past. In order to maintain social distancing, students were asked to follow a simple set of rules when stepping up to the podium to receive their diplomas. Only one administrator was at the podium at a time and did not shake graduates' hands when handing out

Everyone on the field had a mask on except the person at the microphone.

School board members were strategically placed below the stage to be safely distanced.

Chairs were aligned in rows of three for the graduate and their two guests, with at least 6 feet apart between each row. Graduates did not throw their caps in the air upon dismissal, as they normally would enthusiastically. Instead, they walked off by row, silently.

Dessy Claffy, Stephanie Wymer and Polly Hughes sang the national anthem at both ceremonies.


The graduates of WIHS walked onto the field to "Pomp and Circumstance" playing over the loudspeaker, while WHS had recordings of the seniors from the Celebration of the Class of 2020 Facebook presentation playing. Several

firecrackers went off during the ceremony. Speeches by administrators addressed how the CO-VID-19 pandemic had affected students and commended them for their persistence in making it through their last year of high school under such unique and challenging con-



"Our most popular item our cornbread," Obaid said. "We grind our own corn and use no flour in our cornbread. The same goes for our homemade tortillas.'

Obaid was born in South Yemen and arrived in California with his family in 1992.

The Shafter Chamber of Commerce has been busy at work, even as the majority of

city businesses were at a virtual standstill for the past couple of months. The organization has been a go-to source of information when it comes to the status of eating establishments in town, as well as

resources available to local businesses and

individuals.

At a recent meeting, after a lengthy discussion, the Chamber decided not to cancel the popular Fireworks Extravaganza, instead opting to postpone it until Saturday, Sept. 5, which coincides with Labor Day weekend. chamber, "The future of the event was really in the hands of the guidelines put forth by the state and the county. We are following their direction and plan on holding a great show in September." In other action, the chamber have been advising local businesses adversely affect-

ed by the Covid-19 crisis. They have given the businesses information on different programs available to them for short term and long term solutions to help them keep their businesses afloat. One such recommendation was the Kern Recovers program, a forgivable

loan for nonessential businesses that had significant restrictions placed on their operations, including restaurants, hotels, tourist attractions, dentists and optom-

The chamber suggests affected businesses apply for the program at Mission Bank in Shafter.

worked in the fields and moved to the Great Lakes and worked around the Panama Canal in the Merchant Marines.'

"Our father started Fiesta Supermarket on 7th Street as Fiesta Latina Market," Obaid said. "When we decided to open a bigger store, we looked all over for a building we could use; however, we ended up building our own from the ground up.'

The decorations on the walls imitate Spanish-style homes overlooking a street market. "Our artist created street scenes out of Styrofoam and painted them to look like real homes overlooking a market along the walls," Obaid said.

According to Obaid, Fiesta Supermarket and other small, family-owned stores were able to succeed during quarantine largely because they carried essential items that

big-box stores ran out of. "I would say the first item we ran out of when the quarantine began was Lysol and disinfectants."

One of the advantages Fiesta Supermarket has had during this time is owning their own semi truck that travels to Los Angles and Mexico for products.

However, Obaid admitted that at times they were scrambling to get essential items for their customers like every other store.

In its current location for six years, Fiesta Supermarket is well lit, clean and offers a variety of foods enjoyed within the community.

Beyond groceries, Fiesta Supermarket wants to offer other basic services for its customers. The store is working on an agreement with the city to allow residents to pay utility bills at the market.

But it could have been worse.

"Because Wasco does not depend on tourism as a source of money revenue to the city and because the city has the largest local sales tax [due to Measure X] that continued during the "shelter-in-place" order by the governor," the city was not as impacted by the virus pandemic as it could have bene, Ortiz-Hernandez said at a meeting.

Expenditures increased by \$10.6 million due to the cost of the labor camp's demolition, the inclusion of the Street Maintenance Division in the General Fund for the first time and the funding of funding of high-priority capital projects.

Those projects include completion of a new water well and repairing of two others, plus any TCP 123 treatment that is necessary, along with the razing of the former labor camp buildings on the property.

it is unlikely that the city will spend all of its allotted funds by the end of the fiscal year. In addition to these "savings," the Police Department is cutting almost \$37,000 out of its budget to contribute to the hirings.

When asked by Councilmember Chad Givens and Cathy Prout if these savings were actual savings or just assumptions that the city would not use

all of its funds by the end of the year, Gonzales said, "Yes, it is assumed that the city will not use all of its allotted funds so there will be a savings there that will cover the cost of the additional officers." Givens asked what would happen in the unlikelihood that the money was spent, and he was told that they would have to approach the council at that time for the funding.

According to Prout, the aim was to

and in parks as well.

In Shafter, several local businesses have posted signs encouraging customers to wear masks, as well as requiring their employees to wear them.

Enforcement of the mandate has been a different matter. Very few of the businesses in Shafter and Wasco are enforcing the wearing of the protective gear. Customers have been turned away at a couple of local businesses in both cities. AM/PM Minimarket in Shafter and Dollar General have both turned customers away who were not wearing masks upon entering the stores. This was the case at two businesses in Wasco as well, with Advance America, a pay-day loan and check-cashing business, and Status Belize IMAGE Salon, with both businesses requiring both employees and customers to wear masks.

The majority of the businesses in both cities are having their employees wear masks but don't make it a requirement for customers to wear them. Luis Fernandez of True Value Hardware said that both of the locations, in Shafter and Wasco, have all

employees wearing masks, but they are not enforcing their customers to wear them. "We follow what our corporate office asks us to, but as of yet, we haven't received anything regarding the wearing of masks for customers. We wear them as employees to protect ourselves and the public."

Welmert issued a statement in

Walmart issued a statement in which they emphasized that "maintaining customer and associate safety remains our top priority." It also goes on to state that they have posted signs reminding customers of the importance of wearing masks. "We are requiring our associates to wear masks." Walmart, along with the True Value locations and the City of Wasco, are not enforcing the wearing of masks by the public.

The City Hall buildings in Shafter

The City Hall buildings in Shafter are requiring all customers to wear masks inside of the city buildings. They also are doing business in several of the departments by appointment only.

The public seems to be split on the mandates, too.

Over half of the residents observed in Shafter are wearing masks into businesses that require masks, as well as with those who do not require them. But this does not mean that it is done without reservations.

Local photographer Colleen Diltz said, "I don't like wearing the masks. They are hot, I have trouble breathing in them, they fog up my glasses, and I can't see expressions on people's faces."

Diltz did say that she will not buck

the system and will comply and wear the mask while it is mandated to do so. This was not the case with local resident Luis Partuda. "I cannot wear the mask," he said.

"I can't breathe in it and I don't like the idea of anyone telling me that I have to do it."

Partuda said that he will not patronize those businesses that require people to wear them. "I don't see

how they can enforce it anyway. Unless they make it a law, I don't think

that they should be able to make

people do something that they don't want to do.

"I mean, this is not like telling people not to speed, or assault somebody. Me not wearing a mask doesn't make me a criminal, and I refuse to be

munity. "The best-case scenario we have is if a resident sees the activity and knows either who is doing it, or the precise location of the activity. 



Build on the good stuff

"Few men during their lifetime come anywhere near exhausting the resources dwelling within them. There are deep wells of strength that are never used."

-Admiral Richard E. Byrd

Born in the later 19th century, Admiral Richard Byrd was one of those men given to adventure and the intrigue of the unknown. He was best known in my memory as the one who braved frigid temperatures for long periods of time as he explored the then-unexplored regions of the South Pole and Antarctica. However, he was also instrumental in the early stages of transatlantic flight. Admiral Byrd was not the first nor

the last to challenge men and women to dig deeper to find the strength and courage to plumb the depth of their inner innate power. Those of us who love sports cannot help but think of Vince Lombardi who said, "Man's finest hour is the moment when he has worked his heart out in a good cause and lies exhausted on the field of battle victorious."

Theodore Roosevelt, a man with a like passion for adventure and exploration, had this famous quote, "No man is worth his salt who is not

ready at all times to risk his well-being, to risk his body, to risk his life, in a great cause." Therein lies the secret ... a great cause. That cause will vary from person to person, and can be fueled by love of family or country, or love for the Savior. That inner power often lies dormant until a spark flies from the flint of love and ignites the combustible fuel of

Dr. Viktor Frankl and Corrie ten Boom were two such people whose deep love and devotion helped them to survive the atrocities of Nazism and the Jewish concentration camps of WWII. Both reached deep within to survive unbelievable living condition to come out stronger and more loving people. Dr. Frankl was a Jewish neurologist and psychiatrist who had a passion for the psyche of man. This passion allowed him to withstand the brutality of the camps by observing other prisoners' attempts to cope with their challenges.

On the other hand, Miss ten Boom was a Dutch Christian who along with her family hid hundreds of Jewish families in their home, saving many families from the concentration camps. They were caught, and although Corrie was a Christian, spent many years detained in a concentration camp meant for Jews. Her deep love for Christ and the Scriptures allowed her to be a further witness for Christ while detained.

Her power came from an abiding belief in the absolute truth of Scripture. There was one in particular that she hung to, and it is one that you and I can grasp onto today as well. Want hope today? It is our choice: We can either build our foundations on

gold, silver and precious stone or with

wood hay and straw. The difference is this when the fires of trials, temptations and tumultuous times come, and they will, one foundation will be refined and become purer and stronger; the other will "go up in flames" and -poof - be gone. So, build on the good stuff, al-

though more costly they will last forever. Remember the old hymn of the faith as you build: My hope is built on nothing less Than Jesus Christ, my righteousness;


