Restaurants surviving with take out and outdoor dining

While local restaurants have been struggling since March when the state shut down due to the pandemic, a few have met the challenge of keeping their doors open with a limited staff and outdoor dining.

Gov. Gavin Newsom's recent decision to allow restaurants to provide outdoor dining within the past week is also making it possible for local spots to remain open.

Catrina's Mexican Grill and Cantina just opened its doors to outdoor dining Thursday, Sept. 24 as owner Marcela Marquez set up a tent to provide sun-protected tables strategically placed for social distancing. Katrina's is currently serving a full menu.

The restaurant has had a difficult year due to the death of owner Cesar Marquez several months ago. Cesar Marquez was always visible sneaking out of the kitchen to greet diners with his engaging smile and warm welcome and now it is Marcela's turn as she greets everyone.

She engages customers in conversation to keep the momentum up and the atmosphere more inviting and homey. She can be spotted jetting from one table to the

next making sure all the diners have what they need.

Elementary school district to continue distance learning

The Wasco Union Elementary School District will continue distance learning for its general education students for the second quarter, Superintendent Kelly Richers announced via letter to parents.

Beginning in October and after plans are approved, on-site instruction will begin only for certain at-risk students, including selected special education, homeless and EL students. The students will be individually informed when and where to report to a campus and instructor as determined by law and need.

The district is hopeful that after the second quarter, the district will return to in-person instruction depending on the Kern County Public Health De-

partment's recommendation and state requirements imposed at that time.

The district will not make the switch from distance learning to in-class learning during a quarter, it will only take place at the end of a grading period.

"Class time will be three hours a day," Richers said. "Starting times will be staggered because of the transportation requirements. There cannot be more than seven students on a bus at a time."

"Bus drivers will drive one bus on one route and won't be changed," he added.

James Forrest Elementary School, Teresa Burke Elementary School, Palm Avenue Middle School and Thomas Jefferson

The virus outbreak is still seeing new cases in Shafter, but the number is significantly lower than the increase of the week before. There were only nine new cases in Shafter,

according to the Kern County Department of Public Health, with Shafter's total at 1,253 cases. Wasco has seen their numbers increase, with a total of 500 cases to date.

The number of residents wearing masks has increased dramatically, with the city littered with citizens wearing face coverings

Local man to oppose current Richland board president

In the only contested race this November involving Richland School Board candidates, newcomer Julian Armando Calvillo is vying for the seat in Area 3. He will be running against current president Deanna Rodriguez-Root.

Calvillo is a college-prep tutor and college peer-mentor for the Wonderful College Prep Academy/Delano HS/McFarland HS. He has a long history of educating high school students.

Calvillo said that he enjoys helping stu-

dents achieve their educational goals. In addition, he is working towards a masters degree in biology so he can pursue a career in therapeutic gene research.

Calvillo believes that his work experience gives him an advantage when recognizing needs in students as well as possible deficiencies that may need to be addressed.

"Based on my experience working with students, I have learned to identify educational gaps and best practices that address various educational deficiencies some stu-

dents encounter," he said.

Calvillo said that he is running because the Richland School District is where he first gained his love for learning.

"I have a great respect for the educators of Richland and I want to help attain the success that I know Richland can achieve," he said.

When asked what issues that Richland currently faces, Calvillo said that a major one is student safety. "Scientists have stated that the pandemic won't go away on its own, therefore, it must be treated with caution."

Calvillo said that he believes that one of the main purposes of the Richland School

District is to ensure that students are adequately prepared for high school education.

"Currently, incoming freshmen to Shafter High School have about a sixth grade reading level," he said. "This indicates a severe lack of reading ability from our students."

Calvillo's vision is to help the board become a community driven body that collaborates with community members and Richland staff to achieve a new standard of success.

"This means improving board-community relations by making the board more accessible to the community," he said.

Candidates vying for 2 seats on WUHSD board

A number of candidates are vying for seats on the Wasco Union High School District governing board this fall. There are two seats available with three candidates running for the board.

Joel Ackerknecht

Incumbent Joel Ackerknecht's priority on the board is to return students to the campus as safely as possible amid the pandemic.



"The biggest issue is how to bring the students back to campus safely and effectively," Ackerknecht said. "We have done a great job with being forced into a distance learning education, but there is no substitute for in-class learning."

He stated that many factors need to be considered when bringing back students to campus.

"This will be the biggest challenge over the next year," he said. "Kids need the social and academic aspects of being on campus and in the classroom, but it must be done with a common sense and rational approach."

Ackerknecht was born in Pasadena and was raised in Santa Cruz. He attended Pepperdine University and received a bachelor's in biochemistry.

He has been in an agriculture background for the past 22 years as a farm manager for a local mid-size family farming operation based in Kern County.

Ackerknecht has been a board member for four years and has not missed a meeting to date.

"I would like to see a more harmonious relationship between the staff and administration at WUHSD," he said. "I believe a healthy relationship between teachers, staff and administration is imperative. We live in a small community, which means everyone sees each other around town, including the grocery store, Starbucks, etc., and if acrimony or animosity exists, it affects everyone. I will strive to bridge that gap and promote healthy and positive relationships."

His wife Sally has been an attorney for Kern County for the past two years and was a Tulare County Public Defender for seven years prior to that.

He has lived in Kern County since 1998 and a resident of Wasco since 2002.

While Ackerknecht states that he is not a fan of distance learning because he believes teens need purpose, socialization, in-class learning and to be involved in clubs, sports,

food service, etc. However, he has been thrilled at how well the school has handled the state-mandate.

"Our 1:1 Chromebook ratio and over 500 Wi-Fi hotspots have allowed our students to remain engaged, receive live instruction and get the best possible education in these circumstances," he said. "Given the restrictions that have been thrown at our staff and especially our IT Department, they have performed tremendously to provide the best distance learning environment possible."

Ackerknecht would like to continue to support administration in its objective of equity for all students while maximizing achievement and would also like to promote CTE as a pathway for students to receive college credits and job skills while still in high school. He will continue to promote fiscal responsibility amidst the terrible current state of California's financial position.

"In the past four years, I have brought a common-sense business approach to this position demonstrating leadership, fiscal responsibility, and forward-thinking development of a CTE program when North Kern Vocational Academy was no longer financially viable, while continuing to push administration for improved student achievement at all levels," he concluded.

Stacy Nicol

Incumbent Stacy Nicol was born and raised in Wasco and was a substitute teacher for over 30 years, of which 25 were at the high school.



"Currently the most important issue facing the district is the reopening of school during this COVID pandemic," she said. "This is more important than anything else that I have faced as a board member over the last four years. We must get our students back on campus safely."

She feels students are falling behind academically and she is very concerned about their mental health during the isolation.

She also says that "Wasco High is experiencing a lot of change such as the naming of a new superintendent."

"In these coming months, we will be hiring a new athletic director and a new assistant principal," Nicol said. "Beside the changes in staff, I would like to see some changes at our Ag Farm."

Nicol mentioned that the board was recently able to install new fencing to protect the animals, students and staff from wild dog attacks. "But there are many other proj-

ects that need to be addressed."

Nicol spent her entire childhood living in Wasco on Maple Avenue. When she married her husband, they moved to his family's property on Magnolia Avenue where they raised their children and where they still reside.

"I am incredibly proud of our administration and how they have handled the pandemic," she said. "The suddenness of this situation made it all that more difficult. We didn't have weeks or months to plan for this, but our staff quickly made adjustments to distance learning."

She described how getting the Chromebooks and internet access to all of the district's students was challenging, but the district was able to do it in record time.

"I don't believe distance learning is the best way for high school students to learn, but I do think it will prepare them for how they will learn in college," Nicol added. "High school students need more than just academics. They need athletics and activities to keep them busy and to help develop character. They need to build friendships and interact with their peers and also with adults."

As an incumbent, she would continue to do what she has been doing and will work along with her fellow board members and superintendent to set the direction for the school.

"I will also work to make sound fiscal decisions," she said. "I look forward to working with a new athletic director and reviving our sports program. Most importantly, I will work to create the best condition for student achievement."

Prior to Nicol being a board member, she contributed to Wasco High by being an involved parent and committee member. She served on the Site Council and the Bond Oversight Committee. She was the president of the Football Booster Club and has been an active member since 2000 to the present day. "I am also director of the Wasco Athletics and Activities Club where we raise funds to provide the extras for our students' sports teams," she said. "For the last 10 years, I was a founding member of the Tiger Cage Cooking Crew."

The Tiger Cage Cooking Crew is a group of folks who cook dinner every Friday night during football season for the season ticket holders and many others. She is also a big supporter of the FFA program and has enjoyed numerous opportunities to judge their many contests.


"I was very sad to see our North Kern Vocational Trade School dissolve, but I am thrilled with what has transpired since," she said. "We now offer 12 different career pathways and over 51% of our students are enrolled in these (vocational) classes."

During her time on the board, she has had the privilege to see over 90 students complete the Wonderful Ag Academy and graduate with their A.A. or A.S. degrees.

"I have also enjoyed seeing the completion of the science building renovation and the renovation and opening of the Student Services Building," Nicol said. "Lastly, I am pleased to say that after a tragic winter at our Ag Farm, we now have protective fencing securing the safety of our animals, students and staff."

John Steward

Board candidate John Steward was born and raised in Wasco and attended Bakersfield College as well as other colleges to obtain his Career and Technical Education (CTE) teaching credential.



Steward would like to see drivers education brought back

Steward has a professional construction background and at one time owned a small construction business, and worked for the City of Wasco before becoming a teacher.

"I think the most pressing issue facing the district is the lack of CTE (vocational) classes available for students who want to go straight to the workforce when they graduate," he said. "I would like to bring back driver's education/training to Wasco High," he said. "Many students can't afford the class so they have to wait until they are 18 to get their license."

Steward wants to expand the CTE by hiring adjunct teachers to teach a single class. "For example, this would allow us to grow one section at a time and not commit to a full-time teacher to teach Pharmacy Tech, but just for one section," he said. "This would allow for a variety of new classes at a much more affordable price to WHS."

Steward also commented on the current distance learning in place by the district. "Nobody likes distance learning, but I believe WHS has done a fantastic job following the state guidelines to put out the best school product that we can until we can safely open back up," he said.

While Steward was a CTE instructor at WHS he said, "In my 19 years of teaching Wasco High students, we did many projects. We roofed buildings, painted, built retaining walls, poured sidewalks, remodeled a band classroom and installed benches at the tennis courts."

In addition, Steward was instrumental in having his students build a press box for the Wasco Reserve Baseball team.

"The project that sticks out in my mind though was building the Memorial Pergola at Independence High School in honor of Gabby Soto," he said. "It was an honor to build that."

resulting in those animals finding their forever homes throughout the state. The Animal Control Department, even during the pandemic closure, was operating as usual, picking up strays, answering emergency calls and licensing.

Riddick said that unfortunately, due to the pandemic, they were not able to hold their low-cost vaccination clinic that usually draws over 100 pet owners to Mannel Park. He said that they would resume that offering when it was deemed safe and is allowed by the county guidelines.

It is also important not to forget about

your pet's needs during this pandemic, Riddick said. Your pet still needs exercise and engagement, which can be a challenge in this current situation. But, it can also be used as a good opportunity to bond with your pets, making time for some one-on-one interaction. Riddick said that they have already seen some of the animals find homes since they opened back up.

Regarding Bakersfield's recent decision to allow hens within city limits, Riddick said the Shafter City Council has not had anyone voice interest about changing the city's ordinance banning any type of farm animal to be raised within the city.

"I could see people's points when the pandemic first hit, with the limited supply of eggs that were available that people might want to have their own supply at their house, but with the availability plentiful now, it is a different situation," he said.

Gunshot fired at Hotel Rosedale, 2 arrested

Two men were arrested after a gunshot was fired at a local hotel.

The Bakersfield Police Department responded to the Hotel Rosedale on Monday evening. Edwin Lara, 21, and Jose Bernal, 37, both of Shafter, were arrested after an investigation of a shot being fired.

Officers were patrolling the Hotel Rosedale when they heard a single gunshot. A man was seen running into a hotel room. After investigating, the officers arrested Lara and Bernal on several charges. At the scene, two handguns were recovered, as well as several hundred rounds of ammunition and some methamphetamines.

The two Shafter men, both documented gang members, were arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance,

possession of a controlled substance for sale, possession of a firearm by a felon, possession of ammunition of person prohibited from owning or possessing a firearm, participating in a street gang and obstructing/resisting a peace officer.

Bernal's bail is set at \$100,000. He is set to be arraigned Oct. 14 at the Metro Division Courthouse on Truxtun Avenue.

Bernal was already scheduled to appear in court in Shafter on Oct. 6 on a charge of battery/spouse, exposure for a readiness hearing. In 2013, Bernal served over seven months in Wasco State Prison for narcotics charges. The investigation of the incident at the Hotel Rosedale is ongoing and anyone with information on the case is urged to contact the Bakersfield Police Department at 661-327-7111.

On Saturday, customers Jody and Stephen Burt arrived with their entire family to relax and enjoy a family meal. Burt's family shared an entire table and was happy to know that Catrina's was back open again.
"We've been coming here for years," diner Jennifer Keillor said. "It's good to see it back open."
The Keiler's brought their 8-month-old daughter Poet along to enjoy the evening with grandparents and family members.
There is a long list of loyal customers who were not only friends of the family, but loyal customers because of the authentic Mexican cuisine.
Catrina's specializes in Chili Colorado, tender cubes of beef simmered in a spicy red

sauce made from dried Chiles and spices.
Catrina's also offers a variety of appetizers, mariscos, chimis and burritos, sopas and salads along with best sellers such as fajitas and molecajetes. Catrina's also offers a selection of traditional Mexican desserts such as sopapillas and banuelos (crispy flour chips covered with cinnamon, sugar and Kahlua honey), deep-fried ice cream, churros and flan.

downtown and in their respective neighborhoods. At Shafter schools, the sites are readying for a return to in-person instruction for several students. The Special Education departments of the schools will be teaching on-site for their Special Needs students, as well as a select few including foster children, as well as at-promise students.
The majority of businesses in Shafter have opened their doors, with them operating with customers wearing face coverings, as well as staff at the businesses.
City buildings remain closed to the public, with a window around the back of the building serving customers. They also are serving those residents that need to complete transactions with in-person interac-

tion by appointment only.
The City Council has also announced a change in start time for its meetings. The next council meeting will be held at 6 p.m. with residents able to participate via Zoom and YouTube. The council approved this change in time at its meeting last month by unanimous vote.
City Manager Gabriel Gonzales said that Shafter was the only agency in the county that had a later starting time of 7 p.m. of the different city governments.
