

Caboose finds new home at Shafter Depot

The Shafter Depot Museum unveiled its newest exhibit on Saturday, opening a bright red caboose that was donated to them over two years ago.

James Frances, who had a passion for trains, had built his own railway of sorts on his property in Terra Bella. The display consisted of train track, the caboose, a hand pump and many other railroad artifacts.

Frances passed away in 2021, and his family was looking for somewhere to give some of his collection that would

appreciate the pieces and their history. Step in the Shafter Depot Museum. The museum, headed by curator Stan Wilson, was happy to accept the caboose and set a plan to get the train car to Shafter. It was transported to the museum, and it was placed on newly laid track. Mike Romero and Daniel Diaz, of Steve Holloway Painting, also did a fantastic job on the restoration of the caboose and returning it to its vintage state.

The ribbon was cut at the museum on Saturday with Wilson, along with museum board members and city dignitaries. May-

or Chad Givens said a few words about the event, saying that it was important for places such as the museum to keep a city's history alive. "We need our children, and their children, to know where we came from, the rich history of Shafter, and how we got to be the city that we have become."

Wilson said that the exhibit is open to the public, with everyone able to tour the inside of the refurbished caboose. There are also other new items to the collection, including a railroad hand pump that is located next to the caboose.

Wilson explained that with today's technology and transportation operations, the need for cabooses no longer exists.

"The public will have to go to a museum to be able to see one of these proud machines," he explained.

A couple of caboose songs were performed for the crowd by Randy and Cheryl Toews, who sang "I've Been Working on the Railroad" and "Someone's in the Kitchen with Dinah."

The honor of cutting the ribbon went to Shafter's Distinguished Young Woman Emily McGuire, who cut the ribbon. The attendees received an up-close and personal tour of the caboose, inside and out.

The museum is open on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and admission is free to the public.

Councilmember Gilberto Reyna said, "This is a great opportunity for us to bring much-needed resources to our community with our collaborators. It was very well attended by families who were able to access essential information."

"We do these events because we know there is a need in our community, and we aim to fill that void. I'm happy to work with our partners to achieve this goal."

The Dolores Huerta Foundation distributed food boxes. Juan Pimentel Cabrera is a farmworker and received one. "I live check to check. This helps put food on the table for my family."

Mercedes Marquez said she was grateful. "I'm homeless, and I'm thankful for the help. I'm taking home a box of food. I appreciate them doing all this for the people that need it the most."

Lydia Villa said, "Events like this help people like me who are struggling and having a hard time during these tough economic times."

Gloria Ozuna, a health broker from Bakersfield Pace, was on hand to share the services her organization provides to seniors living in Kern County.

It is an all-inclusive program, caring for seniors 55 and over through their medical plan.

"We offer many services like transportation, meals, rehabilitation and a senior center where they can come and participate in daily activities and socialize with other people their age so they can continue to be active and healthy."

She said the center is the part that keeps the seniors engaged. "We go on trips to the museum, movie theaters, bowling and parks. It's all at no cost to the participants."

The organization has its own geriatric doctors, nurses, and medical staff on site. "We also have a beauty/barber salon for free haircuts."

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

The Shafter High Generals football team played one of their best games of the season on Friday night, pounding their rivals, the Wasco Tigers, by a score of 49-6.

In a standing room only crowd at SHS stadium, the Generals gave their fans a lot to cheer about. Wasco managed to take the lead on their first drive of the game, making the score 6-0. Then they threw a scare into the Shafter fans when they recovered an onside kick that gave the Tigers the ball with great field position.

But, this time, the Generals' defense held and Wasco was forced to punt. The Shafter offense, led by sophomore quarterback Ezekiel Osborn, only had one play in the first quarter on offense. But they made it count with a 64-yard touchdown pass to Jesus Figueroa, making the score 7-6. The last three quarters, the Generals' defense dominated the line of scrimmage and stopped the Tigers' double-wing offense. The game was played with a running clock for the majority of the second half, with the game out of reach for the Tigers.

On the offensive side of the ball, Osborn and company seemed to be scoring at will. Before there were four minutes gone in the second quarter, the Generals had a 21-6 lead.

The offense was not just through the air. Christopher Espinoza and Cash Gutierrez, along with JJ Vasquez, ate up big chunks of yardage and kept the Tiger defense on the field. Espinoza ended the game with 94 yards rushing, with Vasquez pitching in for 64 yards and two touchdowns.

Osborn was nearly perfect in the air, going 16 for 17 passing for a total of 276 yards.

The Generals are seeded in the Division IV playoff bracket. They will have a bye this Friday, awaiting the winner of the game between Golden Valley (8-2) and Fresno-McLane (7-3), who are seeded eighth and ninth, respectively. With their top seed, they will host all of their playoff games. Their next game is Thursday, Nov. 9.

Either way, with Shafter being the top seed, they will have home games throughout the playoffs. Meanwhile, the Tigers are still in the hunt, in the Division V playoffs, also with a bye his week. Weeded They will play the winner of the No. 7 Delano (6-4) and No. 10 Reedley (3-7). on Thursday, Nov. 9.
