## Richland breaks ground on new building

The Richland School District broke ground recently on a new building that will house a portion of its Expanded Learning Opportunity Program, servicing local elementary school students.

The ELOP, explained Richland's Jaime Cherry, is an after-school program that

gives students an opportunity to learn, as well as have fun after school. "The program allows parents to have a sense of peace while they are at work, knowing that their children are being provided extra opportunities to learn and pursue their passions after school."

The ceremony was attended by Rich-

land board members, Mayor Pro-Tem Cathy Prout, as well as Councilmember Pete Espinoza and a number of community members.

The program, according to Cherry, has tutors for homework, but also has freetime period in which the students can learn a variety of things, such as life skills including sewing. They also can learn music, with the assistance of music teachers,

as well as computers, cheerleading, sports and robotics. "We try to have a variety of activities for the scholars so they can express themselves and learn something that they are passionate about." The program services over 500 students in the district.

According to Richland Financial Director Martin Rodriguez, they are hoping to have the building up by the end of spring See RICHLAND Page 3

# City finances in good shape, council told

The Shafter City Council Tuesday afternoon discussed the status of the city's budget for the fiscal year 2023-24, and also talked about the

future numbers dealing with the fiscal year 2024/2025. The city saw an increase in the net position financially, with an increase of \$8.1 million, giving the city a net position of \$235 million in assets.

This increase, according to Financial Director Roger Sanchez, is a result of an increase of sales tax and property tax revenue.

Sanchez said that the city is one of the most financially stable cities in the county, if not the state.

There were two departments that showed decreases in their budgets and operated at a loss for the year. One of See CITY Page 3

## Remembering Richard Reding A life of service, faith and community impact

Richard Keith Reding, Sr., born on September 10, 1935, in Montgomery County, Tenn., lived an exemplary life of service above all. He was a man of faith and family, going over and beyond to serve his beloved community of Wasco, where he lived for 59 years. He passed away on March 17 at age 88.

Reding taught physical education, health and typing at Thomas Jefferson Middle School for 35 years. The Richard K. Reding Gymnasium at Palm Ave Mid-

dle School was named after him. Reding also was on the Wasco Union Elementary School District Board for 12 years.


When you go through life, you are fortunate to meet authentically good people. Richard Reding was a really good person, good for his family, good for the community and good for thousands of Wasco students," Former WUESD Superintendent Kelly Richers said,

David Bocker of Grace Community Church was his pastor for almost eight years and said Reding was upbeat, friend-

ly and very helpful. "He was an elder for a considerable amount of time, and he and his sidekick, Delroy Dennison, took care of a lot of things as far as the facility, and fixed a lot of things that were broken and did repairs and were active in that role."

He said Reding's core values revolved around family and that he was devoted to his wife, Sarah. "The way he treated his wife was an example, and it was encouraging to see that. Everybody in the church knew Richard and Sarah, respected them and admired their community involvement."



# Man alleged to take body parts from mishap

A Wasco man was arrested for allegedly removing human remains from the scene of an accident.

The accident occurred on March 22 at approximately 8:05 a.m., when a train fatally struck an individual at the Amtrak

station in the city, according to the BNSF Railway and the Kern County Sheriff's Office.

Rosendo Tellez, 28, of Wasco, was taken into custody for taking evidence from the scene and for multiple outstanding warrants. He was booked into the Kern County Jail.

The county Coroner's Office had not released the name of the victim as of Tuesday afternoon, according to Sgt. Herbert Stout of the sheriff's substation in Wasco.

In a video circulating widely on social media, an individual identified by authorities as the one who removed the body part from the scene. The footage captures him walking down a street in the vicinity, carrying the body part. At one point, he stoops down and appears to smell the lower leg and foot.

In a media request, BNSF Railway responded that the crew was not injured and that the incident is under investigation.

these is the Water Fund. "This is a result of increasing electricity costs, inflation, and an increase the costs for maintaining the filters in the water system," said Sanchez.


He also said that at this trend, it would not take long for this fund to be depleted. To this problem, the city is going through a rate schedule study, resulting in a possible increase in water rates for residents. "The last increase in the rates was over seven years ago, and we are looking at a rate study for advice on how to go forward." Another is the Waste Water Fund, which saw a significant decrease. City Manager Gabriel Gonzalez said that this also is a result of increased electricity rates, maintaining the sewer plant and the filtration systems. He advised the council that they would have a report on a rate schedule study in the near future.

As far as the General Fund, Sanchez said, there has been an increase in funds of \$4.1 million, to \$47.9 million. "This is even taking into account extra expenses with the hiring of four new police officers worked on their behalf and said that this is a big relief to him and his staff, who are in the middle of a major renovation project of their own, building a sports complex that will rival any in the county.

"We heard the news about the grant; it

was a mix of emotions, happiness, excitement and now understanding that we have to get to work to make sure we get this project all taken care of," Jimenez said.





WHEREAS, the current DA guides the development of the Mission Lakes Specific Plan ("MLSP") area as described in Exhibit "A" ("Property"), including rules for subdivision, phasing of public improvements, and collection of impacts fees; and

WHEREAS, the portions of the Property subject to the DA, in addition to Suburban Land Reserve, Inc., is now owned by additional parties, namely 7th Standard Ranch Investors, LLC, a California limited liability company, and Lennar Homes of California, LLC, a California limited liability company ("Owners"); and

WHEREAS, the City and Owners entered a first amendment to the DA dated December 21, 2021 and recorded January 6, 2022 as Entry No. 222002581 in the office of the Kern County Recorder; and

WHEREAS, the City and Owners entered a second amendment to the DA dated June 21, 2022 and Code as no substantive changes are proposed by the amendment; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Shafter has reviewed and studied the amendment to the Development Agreement and found it to comply with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") as more fully described below.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAFTER DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council hereby adopts the recitals in this Urgency Ordinance as Urgency Findings for its adoption. Based on the entire record before the City Council of the City of Shafter ("Council") and all written and oral evidence presented to the Council, the Council finds the fifth amendment to the DA attached here to as Exhibit "A" ("Fifth Amendment") is consistent with the General Plan and the MLSP area and systematically implements the goals and objectives of the General Plan and MLSP.

The Fifth Amendment is consistent with the objectives, policies, general land uses, and programs specified in the General Plan and the MLSP. The Fifth Amendment will not be detrimental to the health safety and general welfare of persons residing in the immediate area nor be detrimental or injurious to the general welfare of the residents of the City as a whole.

B. The Fifth Amendment will not adversely affect the orderly development of property or the preservation of property values.

The Fifth Amendment eliminates uncertainty in planning and provides for the orderly development of the Property, ensures progressive installation of necessary improvements, provides for public services appropriate to the development of the Project, and generally serve the purposes for which development agreements under Sections 65864, et seq. of the Government Code are intended.

D. The Fifth Amendment is consistent with the provisions of Government Code sections 65864 through 65869.5 and Title 15 of the Shafter Municipal Code.

The loss drops Shafter's season record to 9-4-1.


Coached by Sharaya Durant and Julia Garcia, the squad is looking to hit its stride with the SSL season heating up. The Lady





"Sarah was a major part of the Wasco Woman's Club. They were part of the Rose Parade and all kinds of community and church activities. Anything at church, they were there. They were a fixture at our church.

"And not with a lot of fanfare. He didn't do things to be noticed, but he did things just for the sake of other people, just to be helpful. He served in a variety of capacities in that way, always looking to be involved."

For many years, Reding and Sarah played an important part in the annual Wasco Rose Festival, even serving as the Grand Marshals of the parade one year. Reding was known for riding up and down the parade in his scooter.

When asked how he thinks Reding would like to be remembered, Pastor Bocker said, "As somebody who was faithful to his wife, family, church and the Lord Jesus."

Keith Janzen was in 6th or 7th grade when Reding showed up at Thomas Jefferson. He had him for PE and said he was great. "He was a good teacher and a good coach."

They also went to the same church. "He was there for me since age 12 and on. We had contact both at school and church. He was always a figure bigger than most. He had a commanding voice, and he was tall—especially when you're a kid — he's twice as big. He was always a positive coach figure, and I learned a lot of basketball from him."

Janzen ended up teaching at TJ while Reding was there for two years. "We spent quite a lot of time together there while I was there with him. If I ever had a question about something or how to handle something with a student, he would usually be the person I would go to talk about it with."

He said Reding's impact on the community was profound. "The thing about him is you can say what I said and multiply it by who knows by so many people.

He was so involved in the community, and he helped so many people even after he retired."

"What I will miss most about him is his approachability and wide smile."

Brent Paul is another former student, "Mr. Reding was my PE teacher in junior high (grades 6-8). He was a motivator, a jokester and a disciplinarian. What a package! His students trusted and loved him; they also didn't want to disappoint him. We knew where the line was, and we did not want to cross it. Teachers today don't have the ability to give tough love; he did. That is one of the things that made him so special."


