Cobb made a tremendous impact on the community – a success story as he worked

Tallon knew Rob since he started his teaching career 23 years ago.

for students supporting the needs of all of them, both high-achieving students and struggling learners. He cared about career technical education, helping students develop interests and skills aligned with their career aspirations."

The Shafter Boxing Club has spent the past two decades building a repu-SHAFTER tation of

world-class boxers. At this year's National Silver Gloves Championships in Independence, Mo., they provided more evidence - five National Champions, giving the team the most titles of any club in the competition.

Police arrested Elijah Sanchez, 21, of Bakersfield, afr he allegedly shot another man in the head outside the Shafter Starbucks last **SHAFTER** Thursday morning

At approximately 9:37 a.m., Shafter police officers responded to a call reporting a shooting in the 100 block of West Lerdo Highway. Officers already in the area heard the shots, saw a man running from the scene and detained him it was Sanchez. Officers then found an adult male suffering from gunshot wounds to his head.

McDonald's employees said after

Medical personnel responded and transported the victim to a local hospital for treatment. According to Assistant Police Chief Diana Barnett, the victim, Javier Munoz, of Shafter, is expected to survive, and was in stable condition in a local hospital Wednesday. Munoz goes by the gang

name "Night Owl," according to Barnett. This Shafter Press reporter was nearby when the shots could be heard. Officers had guns drawn soon thereafter at the intersection of West Lerdo Highway and South Wall

They then entered the alleyway that leads to the Starbucks, yelling at the suspect, "Get down on the ground, get down on the ground!" They then took the suspect - still unnamed by the police Thursday night – into custody.

"We are still investigating the incident so we haven't released the name of the suspect," said Barnett.

The Police Department is urging anyone who may have witnessed the incident to contact Detective Fernandez at 661-746-8500.





# Highway interchange dedicated to fallen I

A ceremony was held for Kern County Sheriff's Deputy Phillip Campas with the unveiling of a **WASCO** memorial sign designating the interchange of Highways 65 and Highway 99 in his honor. It was a

touching recognition that brought together family, friends, law enforcement and political leadership, including State Sen. Shannon Grove (R-Bakersfield), who organized Campas died in the line of duty on

July 25, 2021, while responding to a 911 dispatch reporting that an armed man, the subject of a restraining order, was at a home near the intersection of 1st Street and Poplar Avenue. Screaming and gunfire could be heard in the background of

Responding deputies encountered a woman fleeing the home, stating that at least two people inside had been shot, and the suspect then fired at deputies and barricaded himself in the house. Deputy Campas, a Kern County Sheriff's Office SWAT team member, was deployed, and a stand-

Upon approaching the house, the suspect opened fire, striking Campas and another deputy. Both were transported to a local hospital, whereCampas succumbed to his wounds. The shooter also killed his wife and two

sons and died after deputies fired bullets at

The dedicated memorial sign was realized by Sen. Grove in the 2022 legislative session introducing and passing Senate Concurrent Resolution 75 to acknowledge Campas for his service to the community.

"It has been an honor to pay tribute to a courageous hero - Deputy Phillip Cam-

pas," Senator Grove said. "This memorial interchange will stand as a reminder for all who pass it that an incredibly brave officer made the ultimate sacrifice in order to defend others' lives. Deputy Campas' courage and dedication to uphold his oath to serve and protect our community will never be

Maldonado was arrested in January 2022. These charges were pursued after recordings of practiocer sessions were obtained, and there appeared to be inappropriate touching on the videos during a session involving Maldonado and unnamed minor females. The practices took place in the garage of Shafter High School girls wrestling coach Eli Espericueta. Espericueta gave the tapes to the Kern County Sheriff's Department, which then investigated and ultimately decided that an arrest

It was reported that Maldonado was also investigated a few years ago by the Sheriff's Department in Wasco while Maldonado was the code enforcement officer for the City of Wasco, but charges were not filed.

# Wasconian thrives in the global music sce

Kris Tiner is an accomplished jazz trumpet player, composer and educator that will soon be inducted into the Cal State Bakersfield Alumni Hall of Fame. A Wasco native, he credits the town for the many teachers that inspired him to follow his dreams of becoming a professional artist.

Tiner attended local schools, including Karl F. Clemens, Palm Avenue, Thomas Jefferson and Wasco High School.

"I have nothing but fond memories. Wasco is a beautiful place to grow up in. I had all of my family here; my grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins. We always had large family gatherings," Tiner said.

"Even though it was a small town, I had world-class music and art teachers that inspired me along the way. I had teachers that encouraged me to think about creativity and the world beyond the small town."

Tiner first picked up the trumpet in 4th grade and has played the instrument ever since. He said his father was the one that encouraged him, though it wasn't his first

"It was the one I got stuck with when they assigned the instruments in school, so we had to find one, and my dad bought me one in a pawn shop. We brought it home, and he showed me how to play."

He was first introduced to jazz after discovering the music of Louis Armstrong in his grandparent's record collection.

"I went to the Wasco public library and checked out over and over again his records. I spent a lot of time there."

In high school, he fell in love with the music of Miles Davis when he learned about him through his band director, Rob Martens.

"It was an extension of what I heard in Louis Armstrong. With Miles, he played jazz, but his albums are mixed with everything from classical to hip hop. There are so many different colors in his music. He is

still my favorite." "Once I got interested in jazz, it made me dream about Paris, New York and the

other cities I heard about in the music." Of the jazz genre, he said, it's the free-

dom that the music gives you. "It is a way to be expressive and creative in the moment. It's like pure communica-

tion. That is what inspired me about the music when I heard it in that it could just say so much. As a kid, I wasn't comfortable talking to people. I found a way to do that through music and exploring jazz."

Tiner had his first band at 17, where he played at CSUB and different coffee houses in Bakersfield.

Since then, he has performed with his group, the Empty Cage Quartet, whose 2008 CD Stratostrophic on Portugal's Clean Feed record label was hailed as "one of the best things in jazz to emerge in the new millennium" by the UK magazine The He played in a duo with guitarist Mike

Baggetta called Tin/Bag, where they toured throughout the US and Europe. Their CD Bridges was chosen as one of the 10 best jazz recordings of 2011 in Time Out New York. In addition, he played for a long time with a band called Industrial Jazz Group,


"I've made a lot of friendships. It's a global community of creative people that encourage and inspire each other."

# WRPD youth sports season kicks off

The Wasco Recreation and Parks District have an extensive lineup of activities for youth, including NFL flag football, t-ball baseball, coach pitch baseball, Little League baseball and Little League softball. All of the sports programs are aimed at promoting fun and learning the basic fundamentals of the game.

The programs fall in line with the mission of the WRPD.

"Our goal is to provide safe and enjoyable programs to build character and form relationships so kids can play with their peers, make new friendships and learn about the game. Sometimes a child has never played a sport, and parents want to encourage them to try it out," District Manager Chris Serna said,

The NFL flag football team is open to both boys and girls, and there are three divisions for ages 7 - 8, 9-10 and 11 to 14. It is a five-on-five format. The first game is on March 25, and the season ends on May 6. It is a competitive sport where scores will be kept, with a championship game at the end of the season. Players must complete at least one assessment to qualify for the team draft.

The co-ed t-ball baseball program is de-

signed for ages 3-4 years old. The focus is to acquaint the kids with positions, innings and base running. Parents/guardians are allowed on the field to assist their athlete during the game and must provide a glove for their child. Games will be played at Maple Park. It is a noncompetitive sport.

The co-ed coach pitch baseball program is for ages 5-6. Coaches will pitch to their own team. This program will focus on the basics of baseball and building a solid foundation for becoming a successful ballplayer. Coaches are allowed on the field to assist athletes during the games played at the little league field. Parents/guardians must provide a glove. It is a noncompetitive pro-

Little League baseball for boys is broken into ages 7-9 minor, 10-12 major and 12-14 junior divisions. It is a live-pitch baseball program that will teach athletes the foundation of positions, innings, pitching, hitting, fielding, throwing and base running. It is a competitive division, with rules and guidelines from Little League International. All players must attend an assessment to qualify for the team draft.

Participants must bring a glove to tryouts with parents/guardians supplying cleats (non-metal), pants, belt and glove.

Little League softball has three divisions for girls 7-9 minor, 10-12 major and 12-14 junior. It is a live-pitch baseball program that will teach athletes about positions, innings, pitching, hitting, fielding, throwing and base running. It is a competitive division, with rules and guidelines from Little League International. All players must attend an assessment to

qualify for the team draft. Participants must bring a glove to tryouts, and parents/guardians must supply cleats (non-metal), pants,




